# Marking the anniversary of Wycliffe's evacuation



September 2019 marked a special anniversary in Wycliffe's history - 80 years since Wycliffe College pupils were evacuated to Lampeter in Wales.

It was at the outbreak of the Second World War that a number of the Wycliffe College buildings were requisitioned by the Meteorological branch of the Air Ministry, including Ryeford and School House and Wycliffe College moved to its temporary home of St David's College, Lampeter.

The Headmaster of the day, W A Sibly, received a confidential letter of warning on Christmas Eve 1938 that, in the event of a war, Wycliffe's buildings had been earmarked for government use and of course this situation came to pass.

Lampeter House owes its name to this historical link. On Remembrance Sunday Lampeter Old Wycliffians were invited back for the service in Wycliffe Chapel and a celebratory lunch.

At the service Lampeter OWs received a special mention. The TWS wreath was laid this year by OW *Brigadier Richard Clements* (P W 1989), who is also a current parent.

The lunch was attended by five Lampeter
OWs and Mrs **June Everett** (née Dixon) and

their families. Photographs of the day and a pictorial history of the time at Lampeter are available on the website.

This year also marked the 75th anniversary of the D-Day landings and TWS marked this by publishing a collection of letters from OWs who had written in The Star at the time. Included is one OW's vivid account of flying in one of the six gliders in the pre-D-Day invasion as part of Operation Tonga as well as OW *David Paine*'s (S 1932) account of the start of the land invasion. These can be viewed on the website in the 'Reflections' section.



# TWS Awards continue to transform lives

The Wycliffian Society Award, in just three years, has already had a huge impact on lives. Open to any Year 13 pupil, the award takes the form of a grant that gives £9,000 over three years to a pupil going to university who may not otherwise be able to afford to study in full-time higher education.

A panel of TWS Management Committee review the applications and applicants present to the panel on how the grant will help them at university and what they would hope to give back to the Wycliffian Society in terms of support and participation in events.

This year, both **Stephanie Wynn** (was Bagnall C L 2016) and **Max Edgson** (P R L 2018) have been back to school to share their experience with Year 12 pupils on the Life Skills Programme, (See our OWs Give Back section).



**Stephanie Wynn** finished her BA in English and Drama at Royal Holloway earlier this year and has moved to Fitzrovia, London and started her MSc degree in Art, Law and Business with Christies Education.

"It is a privilege to be able to study my passion and work alongside like-minded people on the subject of beautiful artworks. The feeling of 'hard work paying off' has really begun to pay dividends. Every day is exciting, fascinating and totally captivating," says Stephanie.

"In the next few months my class and I will travel to Venice, Los Angeles and Basel as part of our art market practice. After the course is complete in mid 2020, I will be taking part in their work placement scheme, hopefully securing a placement with the auction house itself which is where I hope to begin my professional career."

Our 2018 winner, Max Edgson (P R L 2018) started at Warwick University in September 2018 studying Politics, Philosophy and Law.

Society has been indispensable to me in my efforts to secure a Training Contract when I graduate," says Max. "After my work experience in London at public relations firm Freuds over the summer, I reverted back to my original plan of pursuing a career in law.

"Victoria Vicary, TWS Manager, mentioned to me that Sarah Pugh, an OW and Family Law solicitor, had recently given a talk at Wycliffe Prep School, so I got in touch and she kindly offered me work experience at

Sewell Mullings Logie LLP in Cirencester.

"The experience has also aided my application to the SEO Corporate Law Programme, which I secured after an assessment"

**Sophia Rai** (P HE 2019) is this year's TWS Award winner 2019. She began studying Biomedicine at the University of Worcester in September.

"It is an honour to be given TWS Award.

Although the Biomedicine course is demanding - with lectures (16 hours a week), workshops and laboratory practicals (18 hours a week) - it's very much a lifestyle," says Sophia.

"I have joined the Biomedical Society; meeting students with similar interests and I'm also an ambassador for Project Abroad. This includes travelling to schools and presenting opportunities to travel abroad for students who would like to volunteer in developing countries, potentially enhancing their skills.

"I miss Wycliffe, as I called it home for 11 years and made such unforgettable memories with close friends and we continue to stay in touch."

I regularly train individuals and groups and judge county and area competitions for debating, public speaking, situation vacant applications and other similar events. I found it rewarding to be able, in some small way, to use the skills I have learned to help the pupils at Wycliffe."

Head of Sixth Form, Major *Matt Archer*, invited recent OW leavers to deliver some sessions on their university experience and early career as part of the Year 12 Life Skills Programme. The sessions were positively received and as a result, TWS has had a request to run similar talks on other career areas, including the Armed Forces.

First up was Greg Mason, a former Head of School and squash scholar. On leaving Wycliffe in 2011, Greg went to University College London (UCL) to study LLB Law with Hispanic Law, spending his third year in Madrid. Greg then completed the Legal Practice Course with an MSc in Law, Business and Management and started his training contract with DLA Piper during which, he spent time with the Premier League and Heineken UK on client secondment. On qualification as a solicitor in September 2018, Greg joined Wiggin LLP in Cheltenham. Since coming in to School in May, Greg has been appointed to the Wycliffe College Council of Trustees in September.

Next up were **Stephanie Wynn** and **Max Edgson**, both TWS Award winners. Stephanie has just completed her final year at Royal Holloway, University of London, studying English and Drama. She is currently working towards a career in the Art Law and Business industry. Max had just come to the end of his first year at the University of Warwick where he is studying Politics, Philosophy and Law and was able to give the very recent perspective of first-year challenges.

The Year 13s received a more serious



message in their Life Skills session on Consent run by *Joe Dunne* (C 2014), another former Head of School. Joe left Wycliffe in 2014 and went to SOAS (University of London) where he studied International Relations with a specialism in Middle Eastern politics. Joe now works for The Social Change Agency.

Patrick Price (P C 2014), Sarah Pugh (née Wicks P C 2008) and Ollie Hart (P H 1993)

The three were among the speakers at the Year 8 Careers Opportunity Day which inspires pupils in Year 8 to begin considering their future career paths.

Patrick Price works in Commercial Property in London, Sarah Pugh is a solicitor with Sewell Mullings Logie LLP in Cirencester and Ollie Hart works in the IT industry for Cisco UK and explained the murky world of cyber crime.

Sarah, Patrick and Ollie have very different days in their working lives and the pupils were quite surprised to hear that 25 days

holiday a year is standard. Patrick's role involves early starts in the office from 7am and he usually finishes around 7pm. He enjoys the challenging role and tackling new problems, travelling with work and "generally working hard and playing hard".

He said that although he is quite severely dyslexic, he got great support while he was a pupil at Wycliffe and, combined with a good university degree, that has given him the skills and confidence to succeed in the workplace. His message was that with hard work and determination, you can achieve!

Sarah meanwhile made the choice to work for a smaller local law firm. She advised the pupils to get plenty of work experience. She says "It's just as important to get work experience and then be able to rule out something that you don't want to do. A GAP year was good fun and a way to grow and learn independence."

She thought with writing skills she would enjoy journalism but it turned out that after some work experience on a magazine she realised that was definitely not what she wanted to do or would find rewarding.

Since this event, Sarah has provided work experience for fellow OW, *Max Edgson*.

Sarah said "It was nice to hear from Max, a fellow OW...Although our firm has a very popular work experience placement, I was able to fit Max in as I was impressed with his direct approach. It was great that he felt able to approach me because of the Wycliffe connection.

"He had a real interest in the type of work we do and really got stuck in when he came into the department. Max was diligent and friendly; I wish him the best of luck in his future studies and career."

Wycliffe's strong sense of service and community goes well beyond the school gates. Throughout the year pupils donate hundreds of hours and raise thousands to make a difference.



# STEM Day 2019



Hundreds of Gloucestershire children investigated the science of slime and welded with chocolate as they took part in this year's STEM Day at Wycliffe College.

On offer were a range of workshops, many run by Wycliffe Sixth Formers, and talks by wildlife biologist, naturalist and filmmaker Lizzie Daly and Bloodhound STEM communicator Mike Ford.

More than 425 children from eight primary schools took part in the day's activities.

Matt Archer, Head of Sixth Form, said the day also enabled Sixth Formers to give back to the community and to share their love of STEM subjects.

"There is nothing as satisfying as seeing a young pupil's face light up when they have discovered the mystery of welding with chocolate or creating a primitive tool from a piece of flint," he said.

# Royal appointment

Six Senior pupils attended Buckingham

Palace to collect their Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Awards. They formed part of the youngest and largest Wycliffe group ever to achieve this level.

Each said the hardest part of the awards was the expedition during Storm Brian in October 2017.

Kate Elliott, DofE co-ordinator at Wycliffe, said: "We expected some pupils to give up after a day of driving rain in which they were obliged to wade thighhigh through rivers of water and mud and slide down cascading torrents which had appeared on the hillsides overnight. Instead they gritted their teeth and got on with the business of setting up camp, cold, and in their sodden wet clothes and boots. It was an impressive sight."

# Nova Academy

Wycliffe is now hosting one of eight Severn Stars Under 17 Netball 'Nova' Academies in the West Midlands and South West Regions.

The Academy runs in partnership with Severn Stars Netball Super League Franchise which is jointly owned by the University of Gloucestershire and the University of Worcester. It extends the provision of regular, highlevel performance training to the next generation of potential Netball stars.

The Nova Academies is the next step for players as part of the England Netball and Severn Stars Performance Pathway, as they move on from County Academies.

# World champion

Hannah Shakir-Apps won a global language competition, beating 17,000 competitors. The Year 11 pupil scored 39,854 points

and answered a staggering 58,890 questions in the Language Perfect World Championships.

The Championships is a global competition that ran for one week and encourages pupils to earn points by correctly translating between their target language and English. The points earned enabled pupils to qualify for certificates, awards and prizes.

Wycliffe was one of the top five schools in the competition with an average score of 1,895 points per pupil and the top school in the 1-50 pupils category.

# Forest School

Learning for the Lower Prep children has become wild and wonderful with the launch of our Forest School last year. Children from Reception to Year 2 pull on their waterproofs and boots to enjoy the Forest School for two hours every other week as part of their school day.

Forest School is an educational concept where children go to the same natural space on a regular basis to play and learn.

# Easy as Pi

Year 5 pupil **Charley Thomas** got a standing ovation at assembly when he recited the number pi to a massive 220 decimal

Pi is the number you get when you divide a circle's circumference by its diameter. Extending the known sequence of digits in pi is very difficult because the number follows no set pattern.

Charley received national media attention for his achievements with reports in The Daily Telegraph and a live appearance on ITV's Good Morning Britain.

He has another 44 hours to accomplish, of which 10 hours has to be solo so that he can achieve his



# John has a head for heights







**John Cleare** (P J S 1945 - 1954) reveals how a love of mountains and the outdoors, which was nurtured at Wycliffe, has led to an amazing career as a climbing cameraman and photographer.



I arrived at Wycliffe, aged nine, five weeks after the war ended. Life at The Grove involved tree climbing, den building and outdoor activities.

At Sherwell, my inspirational housemaster was the mountaineer A.A. 'Bertie' Robertson and in two years I'd devoured every mountaineering book in his library. He took us caving in the Mendips where tight squeezes, rope ladders and underground rivers were ultimate adventures for a 12-year-old.

In 1950 I joined Springfield. T S Dixon was my housemaster, whose charming wife and beautiful daughters enlivened house morale. I became a Prefect, Captain of Boats and played in the 2nd XV.

We'd escaped to Snowdonia during the London Blitz and I longed to climb the mountains I'd seen, then in 1951 Bertie Robertson invited five school boys to come climbing in Wales. I showed some ability on steep rock and soon espoused every aspect of mountaineering, thereafter every holiday was spent in the mountains of Wales, the Lakes or Scotland.

Determined to enjoy National Service, I grew up, gained a commission, travelled abroad, climbed in the Alps and learnt responsibility commanding my troop of soldiers. I became enthralled with photography, subsequently spending three years at Guildford School of Photography. In

1961, I was headhunted to photograph a book of British Gardens and I turned freelance. By now my pictures were becaming 'known', Rock Climbers in Action in Snowdonia, published in 1966, (republished 2016) became a cult book in Britain and America and as a member of the BBC 'Climbing Circus', I shot live TV broadcasts from the Matterhorn, the Old Man of Hoy and elsewhere.

After making several mountaineering movies in Britain and the Alps I was invited to join the 1971 attempt on Everest's Southwest Face as climbing cameraman. It led to Clint Eastwood recruiting me to work on his 1974 movie Eiger Sanction.

I returned to the Himalaya over 12 times and led three expeditions to large peaks.

I was almost 50 when I discovered skimountaineering, since when I've ski-toured all over the Alps and climbed major peaks in India, New Zealand and Xinjiang on ski.

Alas, pedalling my mountain bike over the Wessex Downs must now suffice, and while I can still drive a camera I can't complain.

which make amusing reading. Wycliffe was something of a culture shock for me as I grew up in Kenya. Also I was dyslexic, but not diagnosed until my 50s so spent my school years yo-yoing between the fast stream and the normal stream and between the top five in class to the bottom three.

I was frequently found on the naughty step outside during prep and was always up to pranks including chaining the school gates together early one summer morning.

But my teachers must have seen something as I was eventually made a school Prefect.

Philip Desprès was a huge influence. He taught English as though it was a mix of Sociology and Psychology. I loved it and it proved a huge boon during my later career.

David King (Prep School) gave me such a solid grounding in French that I was able to get into the Sorbonne after leaving Wycliffe.

As to my life after Wycliffe 38 years in the Diplomatic Service (I originally wanted to join the Army and was passionate about the CCF) it has been the most extraordinary experience. It has taken me from the deserts of the Sahara and the Amazonian jungles, to the mountains of Albania and Kosovo; a journey from "An office next to the toilet in the French embassy in Tirana" as the

Telegraph put it) to the council chambers of multilateral diplomacy in Brussels, Geneva and New York, from being Charges d'Affaires "en pied"! to Ambassador and Governor.

For me, diplomacy has always been about people and trying to make the world a better place, while defending the interests of one's country. It has been an immense privilege to have been able to live that vision, to meet and frequently spend time with world leaders from monarchs and princes to presidents, from the head of the Catholic Church to Balkan warlords.

From them I have learnt the importance of the individual. One person can change the world for better or worse and that person can be you, whether it is by planting an idea, winning an argument or leading a negotiation.

I have also learnt that all success depends on the team and I have had some extraordinary colleagues, both inside and outside the Service.

There have also been the scary moments and at least two where I didn't think I would escape alive, but the journey has also been huge fun. Unleashing the creativity and natural enthusiasm of British Diplomats completely confounds the public's stereotype of what we are capable of.

# I never dreamed of playing for my country

Six Heads and two Acting Heads later, things have moved on – the staff common room is no longer a fug of pipe smoke, we have iPads and smartboards, but what hasn't changed is the staff and students, who made working here such a joy."

### **Cricket and Tennis**






