The Service of Remembrance at the Senior School

We remember their sacrifice

Wycliffe joined the nation to mark the centenary of the Armistice of the First World War. We honoured the 550 OWs who served in the war and the 78 who lost their lives.

We also remembered the nearly 400 OWs who served in the Second World War, 66 of whom died.

The Prep School has for some years under the guidance of Head of History, Mr Steven Arman (Honorary OW), been researching those young OWs from the First World War.

This year the Year 8 pupils researched the lives of Frank (Joe) Arkell (SH 1907 – 1909), Stanley Bladwell (SH 1912 – 1917) and Hugh Jones M.C. (SH 1902 – 1905). All three died in 1918.

The pupils' task was to research and use old documents to help them draw up a new narrative to tell 'their' stories. Trying to use the historical skills of how to communicate effectively, using

empathy, contextual knowledge, devising a chronology and the trickier task of interpreting old documents.

Living relatives of Frank Arkell and Hugh Jones were then contacted and invited to school to hear the pupils' stories as well as to share their own.

"It was a great chance for both the families and the pupils to see the purpose of their work and to add poignancy to the Remembrance Service that took place at the School Chapel on the same day," said Mr Arman.

"It was a remarkable day and all involved felt that it was a fitting way to remember what happened 100 years ago."

One of Frank Arkell's family said of the day: "Their (the pupils) understanding of the enormous sacrifices made by the young men remembered in the classroom and during the service yesterday was clearly visible. We were moved by their gravity, sensitivity and wisdom. The imaginative descriptions of

Frank and Hugh evoked a strong sense of how these young men might have felt and thought at the time. All in all it was a magical day."

At the Senior School Service of Remembrance, a moving tribute was created which included photographs of every OW who fought and died in the First World War.

Around 500 people, including a number


Tracing history

How the TWS Award can change a life

The TWS Award, in just three years, has already had a huge impact on lives.

Stephanie Bagnall (C L 2014 - 2016), the winner of the inaugural award, simply states: "Without the TWS Award I wouldn't have been able to go to university. It has meant that money worries don't get in the way of my studies. I can make the most of my time at university and be academically focussed."

Open to any Year 13 pupil, the award gives a total of £9,000 over three years to a pupil going to university who may not otherwise be able to study in full-time higher education.

A panel of the TWS Management Committee review the applications and all applicants are invited to present to the panel on how the award will help them at university and what they would hope to give back to The Wycliffian Society in terms of support and participation in events.

Stephanie is now in her final year at Royal Holloway, University of London studying English and Theatre Studies. She is the first member of her show people family to go to university. She describes the university experience as the most amazing of her life - and the scariest.

"Receiving the Award felt like someone really believed in me. At Wycliffe I had the support of teachers and my mum and brother, but the award reinforced that feeling beyond the school," said Stephanie.

"I don't have any members of my family who have gone to university so the TWS Award is like a security blanket, extending the support beyond what I received at Wycliffe."

Stephanie had planned to go into media but after attending a recent TWS event in London she is now also exploring how she can merge her passions of media and art.

Our 2018 winner, Max Edgson (P R 2010 - 2018) started at Warwick University in September studying Politics, Philosophy and Law. He talked about what the award meant to him, at our London drinks in October and asked OWs for guidance on careers in law.

"As a student who spent all of his time at Wycliffe with a bursary and support from a charitable trust, I was aware

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I wouldn't have been able to
go to university. It has meant
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that university would be a struggle financially. My receipt of the award has been an immense advantage in terms of getting truly stuck-in to university life and making the most of my higher education," said Max.

"Without the constant struggle of getting odd jobs (which is not as easy at campus universities as many imply) or even a position with contracted hours, I am always able to prioritise my studies where necessary."

We are well aware there is a massive skills shortage in engineering and science, and we have to find a way of addressing that. If we want there to be engineers, welders and project managers available in the future, then we need to get them excited about science and maths at primary school age."

Philip's abiding message from his successful career in medicine was "you make your own luck by working harder than the next guy!". Jonty had some great stories and had to skip lunch because he was on 'air' in the afternoon – very cool!

Jonty Messer (*PH* 1995 – 2002) joined us again in November for Wycliffe Talks. He is currently co-presenter for ITV News West Country. With more than a decade working in commercial and BBC newsrooms across the South West he has covered a wide variety of stories including the 2015 murder of Becky Watts in Bristol, the Tipper Truck crash in Bath, the Rugby World Cup, Cheltenham Festival and Bristol Balloon Fiesta.

His love of broadcasting began on the family farm in Wiltshire, where he spent his school Summer holidays driving tractors with only a radio for company. After graduating from the University of the West of England, Jonty went on to gain a Postgraduate Diploma in Broadcast Journalism; his career began as a sports commentator with BBC radio Bristol and since then he has worked as a broadcast journalist, editor, producer and reporter in both radio and television before taking the role as the presenter of ITV's flagship regional programme covering the South West in 2018.

Jeremy Woolcock (J SH 1957 – 1965) better known as Jeremy Nicholas came in to adjudicate the House Drama competition in November.

Kirby Challenge

From sleeping rough in the quad, completing a three-hour swimathon and picking up litter – Wycliffe's Year 8 pupils are up for the challenge.

The pupils never cease to impress with the ideas they come up with for the annual Kirby Challenge which benefits either the community or the College. And 2017-2018 was no exception.

One pupil slept rough in a box in the school quad to raise awareness of the homeless. Two girls slept overnight in an emergency shelter in the quad during one of the coldest nights of the year. Their efforts raised more than £1,000 for ShelterBox. Three boys completed a three-hour swimathon in

relay at five-minute intervals.

Launched in 2010, the Challenge is named after Roger Kirby (HOW Former Staff 1963 – 1997), a retired Wycliffe Housemaster. During his 30 years at Wycliffe, Mr Kirby took children on wild and wonderful expeditions and made a significant contribution to the community.

A lifelong taste for adventure

When OW Tim Luke (SH 1969 - 1974) decided to cross the Atlantic single handed, he knew it would be a challenge but Tim has always had a taste for adventure.

Aboard his Vancouver 34, Medusa, Tim was the first to finish The Jester Single Handed Transatlantic Challenge 2018. It took him 40 days, facing squalls in The Bay of Biscay, North Atlantic gales and coping with an average of 75 minutes' sleep at a time.

Tim's taste for adventure started not long after he left Wycliffe and joined The Paras. His first adventure as a young officer was to organise, in just 13 months, an expedition with a team of Fusiliers to climb the Matterhorn. Since then he has never looked back.

The idea of sailing came during a works Christmas party when a friend asked Tim if he wanted to be part of an adventure to visit the 'Five Kingdoms' via a Wayfarer (a rigged sailing dinghy). They never made it to Scotland but it was such fun that Tim was hooked.

During strong winds mid Atlantic, Tim spent hours huddled under the hood trying to avoid the worst of the spray but getting soaked through anyway.

"Just as things were getting threatening I spotted something out of place - a fast approaching pod of dolphins," said Tim.

"Up to 30 of them with six airborne at

a time. We only shared one another's company for five minutes but it was as if they were saying 'don't worry mate, you'll be fine'."

Tim says it was the leadership opportunities at Wycliffe which helped shape him. He ran Wycliffe's first student council, was Head of House, Captain of Boats and was involved in numerous sports.

"As 17-year-olds we were given a lot of responsibility and had the chance to develop leadership skills on the sports pitch and in the House," he said. "At Wycliffe there was an opportunity to identify and develop your strengths."

Following eight years in the Army,
Tim went on to a career in leadership
development which also includes
mediating disputes and executive
coaching. He organises trips for
groups to travel to remote parts of the
world and gives inspirational talks in
schools and for corporate clients.

He is also researching a major expedition for the near future but, is remaining tight-lipped about it at the moment.

New Year's Honour

Robert W James (J SH 1946 – 1955) was awarded a British Empire Medal by Her Majesty the Queen in the New Year's Honours for over 50 years of service to the community in his home town of Hungerford, Berkshire.
