- To cover the breadth of options that school leavers pursue
- To recognise the agile nature of modern working trends

For Year 13 leavers, the focus is on Academic Endeavour, Pioneering Spirit and Global Citizenship with individual awards and for the Alumni, Awards are offered in field of Entrepreneurial Spirit and Continued Professional Development. Wycliffe College Update

Informal speech from the Head of Wycliffe College, delivered at TWS event at The Oriental Club on Thursday 12th October:

Let me start with my own 'thank you' to Sara Smalley who has really moved us on and sharpened up our act these past couple of years.

So... where is your old school 'at' as we stand here now in October 2023? The Senior School has 420 pupils in it split virtually 50/50 Boarding/Day and with the Boy/Girl mix at 55/45. I am very proud indeed of the place's energy, dynamism and self-confidence. And, at the same time, I

am proud of the fact that we have managed to retain Wycliffe's essential identity and ethos. I can assure you without hesitation that the centrality of Chapel and the crucial role played by a sense of belonging to one's House are both - as they have always been - absolutely integral elements of a contemporary Wycliffe education.

The 2022/23 academic year saw us get back (after the limitations imposed by Covid) to offering a full programme

of educational visits including two major overseas trips: an Art/Music/Drama cultural trip to New York in the Autumn and a Spanish trip to Andalucía in the Spring. And we now have an exciting trip for our Geographers to the Azores coming over the hill next week. In Drama, the 2022/23 School Production was 'A Christmas Carol' and we now have a 'new tradition' every

I am proud of the fact that we have managed to retain Wycliffe's essential identity and ethos.

June of putting together a Scholars' Play each Summer which in June 2023 was 'Pygmalion'. January/February 2024 will see the pupils performing 'The Wizard of Oz' in Sibly Hall – we would be delighted to welcome any alumni/alumnae back to Wycliffe who might like to see it. In Music, we have had three members of the National Youth Choir, several members of the Gloucestershire Youth Wind Orchestra, and House Song every September is one of the

big events of the year (the boys of Ward's won in September 2022 and the girls of Haywardsend have just been crowned in September 2023). Activity at all levels of the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme remains incredibly busy: no fewer than twelve members of Year 13 successfully completed every aspect of the Gold Award in 2022/23. Similarly, the Combined Cadet Force remains an important part of Wycliffe life: we had a dinner in November 2022 to commemorate 50 years of Wycliffe CCF, Year 10 Cadets still take part in May's 35-mile Ten Tors event on Dartmoor, and we seem to have a Lord Lieutenant's Cadet every year.

An additional (and notable) feature of last year was the amount of engagement in, and commitment to, charitable and fundraising activity, with almost £14,000 raised for a wide range of good causes such as Breast Cancer, Scotty's Little Soldiers, The Down's Syndrome Association, and Blood Cancer UK. As I speak, five members of the school (plus two staff) are representing us at the Round Square International Conference in Nairobi (Kenya) after we were granted full membership of Round Square this time last year. And in Sport, Rowing and Squash see

us compete at national and international level (seven of our Rowers rowed for GB in Summer 2023); Girls' Cricket has really grown in previous years; and Rugby and Football have now come into the heart of the school as a result of the new pitch installed in front of Ward's-Ivy Grove, Robinson and Lampeter. A young man called Naquan Smith from Gloucester, with us since Year 9, has been the first Year 13 leaver for many, many years to be awarded a

contract with Gloucester Rugby. He is not 19 yet but look out for him!

Do join us at TWS Carols on the evening of Saturday 2nd December if you can. It really is a great event. Or come along for the Remembrance Service on the morning of Sunday 12th November. Or – if you are old enough to have been in the school under George Loosley - come to The Loosley Lunch on Sunday 3rd December.

Thank you very much indeed for supporting today's event.

TWS Awards

From 2023, TWS Award was redesigned and extended to incorporate a range of awards, providing the opportunity to be more inclusive and representative of the pupils at Wycliffe College, the breadth of options that school leavers pursue and to develop the provision of well-being and hardship support for Old Wycliffians, recognising the agile nature of modern working trends.

Year 13 TWS Awards:

'Academic Endeavour' (£2000): awarded to a Year 13 leaver in financial need, who is planning on pursuing post-secondary school study in Higher Education. This award will include those applying for apprenticeships.

'Pioneering Spirit' (£2000): awarded to a Year 13 leaver who has considered, developed, and has the intention to undertake post-18 plans that demonstrate an "independence of thought and deed".

'Global Citizenship' (£2000): awarded to a Year 13 leaver who has considered, developed, and has the intention to undertake, post-18 plans that demonstrate a significant contribution to community service.

Applications for 2024 Awards During 2023, a presentation was given

by TWS to Year 13 pupils, along with

information sent to their Parents and Guardians, outlining their eligibility for the Awards and explaining the application process. Applications were received and at the time of writing, interviews are imminent. Once decisions have been made and awards are given, the pupils and parents will be informed. Later in 2024, we will run the process again for those entering Year 13 in September 2024.

OW TWS Awards:

'Entrepreneurial Spirit' (£2000): awarded to an alumnus/alumna of Wycliffe College, who is developing a business idea and requires financial assistance to further develop it.

'Continued Professional Development' (£2000): awarded to an alumna/alumnus in financial need, who has demonstrated a commitment to undertake a professional development course. This could include

further study within Higher Education.

'Well-being' (3 x £500 per annum): awarded three times per annum to an Old Wycliffian who seeks to access well-being support and demonstrates a financial need that currently prohibits them from doing

Applications for 2024 Awards

Details of the application process for 2024 will be made available in due course via our website and social media.

All applications (for both groups of awards) are considered by a panel of TWS Committee members and applicants will be informed of the outcome of their decision at the earliest opportunity.

Applications and interviews are coordinated by TWS Office, on behalf of TWS Committee.

Each successful recipient will receive £2000 to support their post-Wycliffe plans.

Kathryn writes:

"I began my gap year early, in July, by moving to Henley where I trained to represent GB U19s at the Coupe de la Jeunesse and went on to win a gold medal in Amsterdam in the double sculls. After a few weeks at home, I returned to Henley to begin my gap year at the Leander Club. We train 6 days a week from 7am-1pm. It is great to join such a big high performance women's squad. Alongside this I was invited to visit universities in the USA in September, and I am happy to say I have been offered a scholarship for 2024 to attend the University of Tennessee. In addition to rowing, I have begun my study to be a Level 2 gym instructor for fitness, spinning and exercise classes. This is where the award has supported me this year, as it is my ambition to start influencing others through coaching and training and the financial support to pay for these qualifications will hopefully make that



possible. At Leander I am also hoping to start my rowing coach certification. I am so happy to begin this new stage in my life following on from Wycliffe and am so thankful for the opportunity that this award has given me."

OW Memories

OW **John Evans** (J S 1952–1958) tells us of the lasting friendship and continued gatherings of a small group of boys who met at Wycliffe College in the 1950s.

The story began in 1948 when **Christopher Woodcock** joined the Wycliffe Preparatory School followed by **Alan Porter** in 1949 and **Phillip Llewellin** in 1950. **Peter Beynon** started at the Junior School in 1951 and **Colin Kaye** and **John Evans** arrived in 1952.

Colin and John started in Ryeford and became friends on the first day and over the next few weeks we all became known to one another. Chris moved up to the Senior School in September 1953 and joined Springfield to be followed by Alan, Phil, Peter, Colin and John in September 1954. These moves cemented friendships that have lasted all our lives.

We all shared dormitories at various times went out with each other's parents on exeats and stayed with each other during the school holidays. We played in school and house teams and generally had a wonderful time.

Leaving school from December 1957 onwards we all entered the big wide world, Chris and John to do Civil Engineering, Alan to join the family firm, Colin to become a Chartered Surveyor, Phil after a change of direction to be a successful motoring journalist and Peter to be a Vet. Chris and John, in April 1959, found themselves working for the same firm of Consulting Engineers in London and shared a flat together. Later Phil and John also shared a flat in London just before Phil started journalism. Chris, Colin, Peter and John all worked as bar staff at the Beaulieu Jazz Festival, and we all joined in with various escapades during the early 60's, staying with Alan and Phil when their parents were away and generally partying whenever we could.

We all started to settle down getting married and having children, but we kept in touch and got together at various times.

OW Memories

From Martin Angel (J SH 1948–1955)

"In 1953, like most people, we did not own a television, but we were invited round to a neighbour's to watch the outside broadcast of the coronation on a black and white on their new 12" screen TV - along with about 20 other people. Then, again like the majority of people we had watched in colour the film of the ceremony a month or so later at the local cinema. During the following autumn term, the whole school was 'treated' to another showing of this film in the assembly hall. By then most of us were more than a little satiated with the pomp and ceremony. So when the guards were marching to the tune of 'Soldiers of the Queen', someone began stamping in time with the march. Almost immediately the whole school was stamping in time with the march. This so incensed the master in charge, Kenneth Wilden-Hart, that he bellowed this behaviour was both unpatriotic and disrespectful. He followed this diatribe by tying to storm out of the hall by slamming the door behind him. Unfortunately, the door stuck; the school



erupted into guffaws of laughter.

George Loosely - the headmaster- had no choice but to support his master. He penalised us all by cancelling the planned 'whole day holiday' when lessons were suspended and we were encouraged to escape and explore the surrounding countryside. This was probably as much of a penalty for the staff as it was for us. Was it really disrespectful? Even with hindsight I think not, but it remained an important lesson of how a knee-jerk reaction could go disastrously wrong."



Remembering Paul Etheridge

Paul Etheridge passed away on 6th January 2023, aged 83.

Paul was a pupil at Wycliffe in the Prep, Junior and Senior Schools between 1948 and 1955. But as many will know, his connection to Wycliffe continued and he would later serve for a decade as a Trustee (1979-1989) before becoming Chair of the Council of Trustees between 1989 and 2006 - a period of enormous and significant change across the College. In 2006, Paul took on the role of President of Wycliffe College, which he held until 2021, then becoming President Emeritus.

Many OWs will remember Jason as a capable and diligent teacher & a conscientious, dedicated and compassionate Tutor, who joined the staff at Wycliffe College in 2015.

Peter Rawll

In December, we were notified of the sad death of Peter Rawll who passed away on 5th December 2023 aged 96, bringing down the curtain on an extraordinarily rich and long life in the service of others. He is survived by his wife Cicely and two children, OWs Andrew (J SH 1973-1981) and Katherine (HE 1982-1984).

Peter was Bursar of Wycliffe College from 1972 until his retirement in the summer of 1989 and continued his long connection to Wycliffe, as Honorary Treasurer of the OW Society until 2001.

Previously, he served with distinction as a Royal Marines officer for 27 years, across a wide variety of roles and theatres, including deployment with the SAS during the Malayan Emergency and as an instructor for the SBS, rising to the rank of Major. There were many affiliations within the local community including past terms as Local Councillor for Rodborough, Chair of Governors at The Shrubberies School, President of Stonehouse Rotary, Branch Chairman of the Royal British Legion and Chair of the OW Lodge.




