We're back out there



It's been a busy Summer term as Wycliffe pupils make the most of the easing of lockdown restrictions.

From the Pre-Prep to the Senior School, staff have gone above and beyond to ensure pupils have as many educational and sporting opportunities as they can following the challenging academic year.

In the Pre-Prep, parents were able, for the first time this year, to attend a school event to cheer on youngsters for the Pre-Prep Sports Day.

Prep boarders enjoyed an action-packed weekend at the Cotswolds Country Park and Beach while Year 8 took to the water at The Wave Coventry.

During Eco Week, the entire Prep School took part in a range of outdoor learning activities created to foster an appreciation of local species.

Cricket fixtures have returned to the Prep School after what has been nearly a two-year break. The Senior School finally saw its first girls' Cricket match after COVID forced the delay of the launch of girls' Cricket last year.

After the planned 2020 Senior Girls' Hockey and Netball tour to South Africa had to be cancelled due to COVID, the Year 13 girls managed to get away before the end of term for a mini tour to Cornwall.

Finally, the Wycliffe College Boat Club had its first race of the year at the National Schools' Regatta. It is usually the largest event of the

year and this year was held behind closed doors. The lack of spectators didn't deter Wycliffe girls who came fourth in the Girls' Quad missing a medal by a second.

Wycliffe's Combined Cadet Force (CCF) has had a busy term with a range of exercise days and Summer Camps. There has been adventure training in Capel Curig, range afternoons at Imjin Barracks and exercise days at Bramley Training Area.



For the Senior Boys **Tom Rowlands** (Year 13) 400m time of 54 sec was a very impressive run and in the Junior Girls' event **Abi Opaleye**'s (Year 9) shot put of 8.40m won the event by an impressive 33cm margin.

As well as the House competition for each age there was also the highly contested **Victor**

and Victrix Ludorum trophies for the best individual performances. The results were:

EPQ course is rocketing

Interest in Wycliffe's Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) is growing yearon-year, with approximately 40 pupils undertaking a research project.

The EPQ is equivalent to half an A Level and pupils are able to research any topic which is of interest to them, which leads to a rich variety of outcomes.

It takes commitment to produce either a dissertation (5,000 words) Music or Drama composition, or report/artefact and it is greatly valued by universities as it supports the development of independent research skills that are required at the next level of education; with an increasing number making lower grade offers to those who are completing one.

This year the topics include: Palm Oil: A positive power or an environmental disaster?; Is the jury system still the most just and reliable way to establish

a verdict? and Should sugar be considered a drug?

Louise Knighton-Callister, EPQ
Coordinator, said: "Interest in the
EPQ has grown enormously and
pupils realise how important it is to
demonstrate to universities that they
are capable of independent research
and dissertation writing and the
qualification provides an opportunity
for them to stand out and demonstrate
their academic prowess."



Eco Week sparks interest in Nature





All Year groups at Prep took part in the annual Eco Week and enjoyed a range of activities.

The focus for this year's event was to foster an appreciation of local species.

"Most children know about tigers and pandas, but can they identify a stoat or sycamore tree?" said **Mr Holroyde**. "If they understand more about local nature, they are more likely to want to protect it."

Pupils used the Woodland Trust app to identify trees in the school grounds plus any invertebrates on them, did a nature trail quiz as well as growing cress heads, planting wildflowers, making bird feeders,

canal dipping, installing bug hotels and tidying up the flowers beds.

Year 3 got up close and personal with African land snails and enjoyed canal dipping. Year 4 explored flowerbeds and Year 6 made bird feeders.

In Year 7 English, pupils designed and promoted their own holiday parks, based on the book they have been reading. Flo Smalley and Chloe Newton put a great eco-spin on theirs, by including beehives, wind power, a wildflower meadow and a lake full of corn-fed ducks.

Similarly, Max Meenan and Sam Hart designed an eco-island as part of their

park - you can reach this by sailing on rafts made from recycled plastic bottles.

"The Nature Quiz was amazing and I spent the whole time running around learning about different animals."

Aspire helps us discover new options

All Year 12 pupils have been taking part in the Aspire project, which builds on the mock interview practice of Year 11.

It requires pupils to research a career sector, role or company to which they aspire and to showcase why they would be suited to it as well as the necessary steps to be successful.

For some this is straightforward, for others, indeed many, it is quite challenging. The project also gives the opportunity to explore a range of career possibilities or to research a particular passion, priority or value such as the environment, helping people or problem-solving.

Pupils then create a presentation which must last 6-7 minutes. The brief is to talk to time and to engage and inform the listener and their fellow tutees. Most do this live but in the current climate Teams provided a vehicle for those unable to be physically present.

A team of judges are invited to assess the presentations both for content and presentational skills. They were: **Richard Finch** (S 1968), **Ian Day** (P SH 1977),



John May (W 1982), Tristram Southgate (J SH 1982), Rupert Harris (W 1983), Louise Jensen (P HE 1990) and Greg Mason (R 2011).

The project was launched in January and even before the Easter holidays, having reflected on the brief, several pupils booked to come and talk to me about alternatives to their hitherto focused plan. Others, following judges' feedback and personal reflection, have now booked a careers guidance session.

One pupil said the opportunity to research helped them realise the huge variety of options that exist in their chosen career field and enabled them to work out which ones were of most interest to them and subsequently which modules are essential to the choice of their future degree.

Pupils varied in their ability to present but others were striking in their use of imagery and storytelling. The Aspire experience will undoubtedly have provided invaluable insights for personal improvement.

We are very grateful for the expertise and insight of the judges who provided valuable personalised feedback to each pupil.

As one judge commented: "It's an invaluable experience for the pupils and a brilliant initiative to get them thinking seriously about life beyond Wycliffe."




