We are excited about our new

formed relationship with our school charity for the year, 'Cyclists Fighting Cancer', in which we are looking to develop a 'cycle' of activities that provide opportunity for our pupils, whilst supporting others in the wider community.

Not sure about a snow globe this year... more like a fun fair of roller coasters, merry go rounds and the helter-skelter thrown in. Wycliffe Prep, in the words of The Good Schools Guide, is living up to the statement: 'a small school with big ideas'!

Saturday Morning School

Saturday Morning School for Years 6, 7 and 8 has evolved from being standalone learning opportunities to structured thematic sessions designed to enrich our curriculum.

Due to the flexibility the sessions have, we can use the time to develop some of the critical skills our pupils will need in later life – how to debate and discuss, research, work together as teams to problem solve and to examine some of life's great questions 'If a good person does something bad, does that make them a

bad person? As the Wycliffe Times goes to print, we are finalising the Saturday School programme for the next two terms and shall be sharing with our Year 6 - 8 parents imminently. What is so exciting is the inclusion of Kirby Challenge opportunities for the Year 8s to ensure they gain the most out of the process, the addition of showcase events to invite parents to, two Round Square initiatives which will include collaborations from around the world and even a Festival of Learning!

Q Tell us about your role within the
Prep School and your vision for the

As a family we feel lucky to have landed in such a beautiful part of the world and professionally I feel especially fortunate

to join the team at Wycliffe Prep. In many respects the rolling hills of rural Gloucestershire represent the landscape antithesis of the west side of Chicago, but it's wonderful how quickly we feel settled here and this is testament to the warm and welcoming nature of the Prep School and wider community.

When appointed, I shared my firm belief with Mrs. Grant that I had been appointed to the best job in the world; the opportunity to work as part of a team of teachers to review and enhance a curriculum that will serve our young people, long after they have graduated from the Senior School. These really are the formative years when it comes to instilling a love of learning- plasticity of the brain is at its peak and our young learners must remain our focus as we forge ahead, nurturing their academic curiosity which will lead to future success.

We have a responsibility to prepare our young people to succeed and find their passions in an increasingly globalised world. Here at Wycliffe we aim to do this by embracing the school vision of promoting a pioneering spirit and encouraging individuals to embrace their future as global citizens. Our vehicle for realising this vision is a curriculum that is synchronised and shaped to develop critical thinking, enhanced through opportunities to

problem solving, all the while, promoting and encouraging a love for learning. I envisage a Saturday program that provides every pupil with the opportunity to lead others in collaboration with schools around the world, achieved through our partnership with Round Square, as part of an international network of over 200 like-minded schools in 50 countries.

Q What do you think is fundamental in Curriculum Design?

As a foundation, our teaching staff must be prepared with a duality of both experience and pedagogy. It is our role to stoke the engine fire that is curiosity, which is innate in our young learners. We must keep the flame burning bright! All teachers, with their breadth of skills and knowledge must be involved in the process. A curriculum that is both broad and deep, will work most effectively when inter-disciplinary links can be made and exploited to ensure maximum relevance, challenge and enjoyment. And of course, our pupil voices must be heard to ensure they remain firmly in our sights.

Q What was your first impression of Wycliffe?

I was genuinely taken back - in the most wonderful of ways - by the kindness shown, from both children and staff, in helping me to settle in. Children stopping me on campus to ask how I was doing and listening to the answer was such a considerate gesture and speaks to the character of our community. There is a tangible sense of collective enthusiasm when one walks around our school and this is a very motivating factor: it feels like our vision can be realised here and we can make a mark by sending our young people into the world, leading others with skills, compassion and responsibility.

Q Tell us a bit about yourself?

I enjoy an afternoon watching my beloved Leicester City in a packed and energetic King Power Stadium, as much as I enjoy an isolated country walk in the beautiful Cotwold hills. Having moved to Gloucestershire as a family, with my wife Jenny and two small children, Jack and Lily, we look forward to exploring the sights and sounds of both near and far and being tourists in our own country, after a long stint overseas! I have adopted a love of American BBQ and smoking food is something I'm enjoying experimenting with. We've recently taken tenancy of an allotment and getting back to nature with some homegrown produce is certainly a source of enjoyment for me and my family!

Q What are you looking forward to most over the next year?

Seeing the impact of our collective efforts. Watching as young people step out of their comfort zones, showing the grit, character and resilience to try something new. Observing as our children demonstrate their academic excellence to ensure that they thrive at the Senior School.

As I am sure you will agree, leadership is a constant stream of complex puzzles to be solved. The beauty of educational leadership is that when a puzzle is solved, young people realize their potential: growing into happy and success adults. I look forward to the challenge, nurturing our parent partnerships and being part of a team of educators that will ultimately leave a legacy of setting children up for a life, striving to be their best selves and confidently tackling challenges in the world that may not even exist yet.

UKMT Senior Mathematical Challenge

On the 11th November, our A-Level Mathematics pupils (and several of our high performing GCSE pupils) took part in the Senior Mathematical Challenge – this is a 90-minute, multiple-choice Challenge that encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems. The results of this challenge will be available later in the year and the top performing pupils will receive certificates (which are recognised by universities as evidence of excellent logical/mathematical skills).

Sarah Zhou (Y12) said:

"Solving the fascinating although challenging questions in SMC has shown me the possibilities of mathematics. Personally, the most valuable experience of this challenge is not the result, but the process of thinking and figuring out the problems."

Careers Portfolio Launch


In September, the Careers Department introduced Year 9 pupils to their Careers Portfolio.

Pupils are encouraged to explore and articulate their identity, acknowledge their unique mix of skills, passions and experiences. We believe that only by making sense of who they are as a person, can pupils consider possible career paths.

From Year 9 onwards, pupils undertake exercises during life skills sessions and develop a record of their skills, subject interests, and possible roles. As they move up the school, pupils create a series of targets to address their weaknesses, build their skills and evolve their passions. Every Careers Portfolio is as individual as the pupil that compiles it and often changes as pupils interests develop and they become more accomplished.

Sir Dominic Cadbury once said "There is no such thing as a career path. It's crazy paving and you have to lay it yourself."

With this in mind, we place a real emphasis on career management and enabling pupils to be active participants in their career. By developing lifelong careers management skills, we can equip them for their future career in its many facets and iterations with a positive, flexible and perseverance outlook.

100% distinictions for LAMDA pupils

On the week of the 21st June 2021, 11 LAMDA pupils went to Cheltenham Ladies College to perform their pieces to a LAMDA examiner. Either in a pair or solo, pupils were to perform either 2 or 3 contrasting monologues/ duologues and answer some questions on theatre history. For some, this was their first experience and for others their second or third grade!

LAMDA exams are graded like music exams and are a way for pupils to develop their speaking skills and their characterisation. They are encouraged to concentrate on different styles to help them gain knowledge on a variety of theatre genres. Grades go all the way up to Grade 8, which is equivalent to 30 UCAS points for university places

Ms Mason, a professional theatre actor, director and choreographer, started to



work with our pupils back in September 2020 on their pieces. During lockdown, lessons carried on via TEAMs and were a fantastic way for the pupils to have a creative outlet during this time. All of the pupils felt ready (although nervous) to take part in a face-to-face examination in June. They all performed fantastically and were all given the highest level of distinction for their efforts.

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Historians dig up information on the Tudors



Year 12 and 13 historians spent the day visiting Sudeley Castle and Hailes Abbey to immerse themselves in the Tudors. They began at Sudeley where the pupils looked round the house where Catherine Parr, Henry VIII's last wife, lived and died. An exhibition about Henry, Catherine, Lady Jane Grey and Elizabeth I was incredibly informative.

They were also lucky enough to see an archaeological dig close up, with the archaeologists hunting for the buildings constructed for the visit of Queen Elizabeth I in 1592. After lunch the historians moved on to Hailes Abbey, where pupils could really understand the destruction that was wrought in the Dissolution of the Monasteries.

Organic brewery demonstrates ethical business practice



The Year 13 A-level Business cohort visited Stroud brewery. We had a talk from **Greg Pilley**, the founder, who gave us a tour of the facility. Stroud Brewery produces organic beer and has a strong ethical stance. This linked well with our study of CSR (Corporate Social Responsibility) and pupils were able to make links between business theory and practice.

Greg also explained one of the downsides of using suppliers of organic malt; it costs approximately 50% more per ton than non-organic alternatives. Pupils learned how the brewery has coped with the impact of COVID, switching its business away from pubs towards retailing, even investing in a machine where they bottle their own beer rather than outsourcing this aspect. All-in-all, this was a very worthwhile visit and a highly useful case study that the students can use in preparation for A-level examinations.



A European date to remember

Each year the 26th September marks the European Day of Languages, an important day in the MFL Department calendar. It is a time to dust off the countries flags and put them up to welcome our pupils to the department. At the Prep School we celebrated our Wycliffe pupils who have roots from countries where English is not the official language. Our day started with an assembly where Madame Perhirin quizzed us on language facts

Forging new friendships







The day was widely enjoyed and Year 9 came away with a range of new skills and more importantly a group of new friendships were forged.










Prep Arts Focus




