# Pupils go for Gold!

This year should result in a record number of pupils completing their Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Awards. Those involved have really earned this accolade, with many joining the award scheme in Year 9 and working their way up through the levels.

Five years later, they are completing activities in five sections: expedition, physical, skills, volunteering, and residential. Their DofE journey, from Bronze to Gold, has taken them in and out of the dark days of lockdown, with many having to work their activities around Government restrictions.

The majority have done expeditions on foot: from Bronze expeditions both locally and in the beautiful Gower Peninsula, to a Gold final venture in the remote Black Mountain area of the Brecon

We also have a group who have organised their own Silver and Gold ventures by canoe, navigating some physically demanding and exciting routes!

Pupils undertook activities such as ranger conservation, sea kayaking, a young vet experience, sailing, high ropes activities, and orienteering on their residentials.

# Pioneering spirit sees Ten Tors team reach new heights

On 6th – 8th May, a team of six Wycliffe cadets travelled to Dartmoor to compete in the Ten Tors Challenge.

Open to pupils from across the South West, the Ten Tors Challenge is an annual event organised by the Army's Headquarters South West with support from the Royal Navy and Royal Air Force, as well as civilian emergency services and volunteers.

Celebrating its 60th anniversary this year, the event sees over 2,000 teenagers navigate routes of 35, 45, or 55 miles over two days. In order to successfully complete the Challenge, the teams must reach 10 checkpoints placed atop tors, beacons and hills.

The event is completely self-sufficient, with competitors carrying all their supplies, including tents, sleeping bags, spare clothes, and food in their rucksacks.

In order to prepare for the Challenge, the Wycliffe team completed several training walks, including two on Dartmoor itself. This helped them hone their navigational, route-planning, and camping skills. The whole group was extremely committed to their endeavour, participating in training sessions on Sundays between October and early March, regardless of cold, windy and wet weather conditions.

On the Friday, the group travelled to Dartmoor

and met event coordinator **Colonel Gary McDade**, an Old Wycliffian and two-time Ten
Tors competitor.

After rising early on the Saturday morning, they made their way to the starting line and, after an anxious wait, began their trek at 7am.

Th team made excellent progress, walking for 13 hours and covering a significant distance before setting up camp for the night.

Day 2 of the Challenge saw the group persevere despite the early morning mist. They descended



from the final checkpoint at 2:30pm on the Sunday afternoon, completing the Challenge with a final charge through the finish line!

#### Kirby Challenge Award

The Kirby Challenge Award provides an opportunity for Year 8 pupils to challenge themselves. It gives them a chance to identify and reflect upon their accomplishments, while at the same time allowing staff the opportunity to reward and recognise pupils' contributions to school life and the wider community.

There are three distinct parts to the Award: Contribution, Collaboration and Challenge. In order to achieve the Award, pupils must provide evidence of commitment in all three areas.

On Saturday mornings in the Spring Term, guided by their mentors, pupils made plans to turn their ideas into reality. Some fantastic activities were organised for a morning of action: they ranged from increasing the biodiversity of areas of the school to delivering help packages to a homeless organisation.

Pupils' contributions to school life were also impressive. Year 8 pupils organised sports, reading, and writing clubs for younger pupils, and delivered assemblies on homelessness, Black history, and deforestation. A twenty-kilometre run around the school fields and a marathon badminton match were two of the many challenges pupils accomplished.

The Award culminated in pupils presenting their achievements, failures and reflections to parents, before receiving the new Kirby Challenge Award badge presented by **Mrs Grant**. Congratulations to all those involved on their impressive accomplishments!

# Year 7 visit Chepstow Castle

On Friday 13th May, Year 7 went on a trip to Chepstow to see its amazing, historical castle.

This incredible piece of architecture was first built in 1067 under the instruction of the Norman lord William FitzOsbern. Over time, the next rulers of the castle edited and added parts to the castle to make it just about impossible to ambush.

It is paced next to the river Wye, on a cliff. The castle is built to be a defensive monster, towering over any ambushers; arrow slits are placed everywhere to stop people climbing the walls.

We started by taking a tour around the outside of the castle, looking at how hard it would be to even start an ambush. The rulers specifically dug a trench around the castle, not to fill it with water but to make it easier to spot people and take them down.



Incredibly, the weakest part of the castle is the main entrance (built from 1219-45). It has a massive drawbridge, filling two-thirds of the doorway when up. To ambush the castle, you need to get past the drawbridge, must climb countless metres to get to the top, have to get through a massive metal beam from one side to the other, oh and don't forget the portcullis in the way as well! Then you walk into a bare room, with archers on the walls shooting down at you. You then need to get through another massive gate just to get into the actual living part of the castle. That's the weakest area, think about the rest...

After having a delicious lunch, the man who was telling us all this then showed us the armour they used in the time period. The most used weapon was the spear, cheap to

make, and incredibly useful for thrusting or throwing like a javelin. Our guide also showed us countless techniques on how to use these weapons (and others too!). Then he showed us some really sharp swords; it was crazy how they could cut!

Afterwards, we were all given a chance to go to the gift shop and buy whatever we wanted. As we were waiting, we could go anywhere in the castle. We climbed up some very steep, scary stairs and once we got to the top, we could walk around the different platforms and play hide and seek! We all did a mini photoshoot as well (with **Mr Arman**'s camera!).

I will have to say, this was one of the best expedition days I've ever done, and I will definitely be wanting to go back.

# Through My Lens – The Wycliffe Lecture Series





In a spectacular evening in March, **Professor David Olusoga OBE**, the BAFTA-winning documentary maker, author, historian and TV presenter, enthralled hundreds of guests in Wycliffe's Sibly Hall.

The evening was the culmination of a day of workshops and activities led by another speaker on the night, **Temi Akindele Barker**, as Wycliffe kicked off its membership of the Inclusion Labs Schools Programme.

Also on stage, alongside these two distinguished speakers, was Year 13 pupil **Destiny Thomas**, who grasped the opportunity to give her own personal take on the shared theme of Through my lens..., featuring perspectives on equality, diversity and inclusion. Destiny spoke with passion and eloquence, comparing her life in a London borough to that as a boarder in rural Gloucestershire.

**Professor Olusoga** movingly recounted his own experiences as a young Black Briton, and shared his reflections on race from a historical and structural perspective.

Ms Akindele Barker also used touching personal testimony, including her children's experience in education, and offered thought-provoking and stimulating assessments of all aspects of equality faced by young people.

After their talks, the presenters engaged in an extended Q&A session with the audience, and Professor Olusoga stayed late signing his books at the pop-up bookstore arranged for the evening.

Among the crowd watching were invited representatives from a range of local schools, as well as pupils, parents and invited guests. They were treated to an evening not to be forgotten, with large numbers of those present contacting the school in the days that followed to express their appreciation. The buzz has continued around the school ever since.

The event, organised by Wycliffe Senior School Scholars' Society, marked the re-launch of the Wycliffe Lecture Series two years after Poet Laureate **Simon Armitage** had graced the same stage.

The Wycliffe Lecture Series invites significant speakers to the school for the academic enrichment of its pupils. In addition to Simon Armitage, past speakers have included poets Owen Sheers and Daljit Nagra, historians Lord Peter Hennessy and Tracy Borman, and anthropologist Lewis Dartnell. As well as open access talks, the speakers engage in small group workshops and take supper with members of the Scholars' Society.

In his introductory welcome, organiser Sean Dunne (Deputy Head Academic at the Senior School) said: "For us at Wycliffe, this is not just an evening; it is part of a process of self-education and of understanding, as we strive to ensure our pupils can become global citizens, so that every one of our community can be comfortable in who they are and celebrated as themselves."

Inclusion Labs is an independent, community-interest organisation that creates programmes to embed diversity, equity and inclusion into every young person's educational, cultural and personal development. There will be more news on the Schools Programme in the Autumn.
