Introducing the Wycliffe Discovery Programme

Today, more than ever, we live in a global community. To thrive in this ever-changing interconnected world, pupils must have the confidence to step outside of their comfort zone, try new things, their pioneering spirit and embrace unfamiliar ideas.

Indeed, it is often when we are being exposed to challenges and new experiences that we learn most about ourselves, flourish as individuals and our place in the world. During the Prep years in particular, pupils are primed to learn and adapt, and they respond particularly well to first-hand experiences.

Therefore, after a period of careful review, our Saturday School programme has been re-launched as the Wycliffe Discovery Programme. This newly created programme has been designed to build skills of communication, problem solving, collaboration and leadership,

through a series of carefully structured units across the year.

So far this term, Year 8 pupils have completed a three-week Kintsugi Art and Philosophy unit. Kintsugi is the Japanese art of repairing broken pottery with a gold-dusted lacquer, centred around a philosophy that celebrates imperfections. They have also learnt about the principles of flight, with **Mrs Cleere** arranging for a fully operational glider to be brought onto campus, and have worked alongside MOD engineers who shared their experiences in the field of aviation.

Meanwhile, **Mrs Patten** led our Year 7 pupils in a simulation of the UN General Assembly – the Model United Nations - where young people work as representatives of a country, debating and solving global problems while learning about diplomacy and international relations.

Year 6 were set an entrepreneurship challenge to 'make £5 grow'. Each 'start-up' was tasked with the goal of making £5 grow to benefit our School charity, learning skills of marketing and budgeting along the way. This five-week series teaches pupils the value of a growth-mindset, where they must learn from failure and develop grit and resilience to achieve their goal.

The pupil body at Wycliffe has a thirst for adventure and an intellectual curiosity and, as you can see, the Discovery Programme aims to build on this, stretching and challenging pupils, allowing them to engage with new concepts and develop the skills they will need to be fully rounded global citizens of the future.

The deserving winners, however, were Loosley Halls with their incredibly original and innovative entry: an interactive map of songs. The songs represented each of the languages spoken by Loosley pupils and were accompanied by codes which, when scanned, played each song on Spotify!

Over in the Prep School, pupils welcomed **Steve Eadon** from Mingalaba who spoke to Years 7 and 8 about the job opportunities given to those who speak foreign languages.

Steve spoke about his journey from a reluctant learner of German at school to working for Arsenal Football Club. Steve went to university to study German and Spanish,



spending time in Germany and Spain while doing his degree. This experience gave him that extra 'edge' that Arsenal was looking for and he was selected to coach for the club in Kenya and the Caribbean.

During his time at the club, he also used his skills to promote languages whilst working with famous football players.

Pupils were able to ask him about his career at the club and spent the morning working with him on different activities.

English Is Not Enough

On Wednesday 9th November, the MFL Department ran its annual English Is Not Enough event. The event's mission is to enthuse our Year 9 pupils about the wonderful possibilities that learning languages can deliver.

MFL Enrichment Talks inspire



Year 3 pupils learn all about Diwali



A faraway kingdom long, long ago; noble princes and a strong, beautiful princess; a wicked stepmother; exile in an enchanted forest; an evil ten-headed demon; a super-powered flying monkey; trials and tribulations; bitter struggles; epic battles; and the triumph of light over darkness and good over evil... what's not to love about the epic poem The Ramayana and the festival that is based on it: Diwali!

Every year, over a billion people in India and around the world – Hindus, Jains and Sikhs - celebrate Diwali with family and friends, exchanging gifts, eating special food, enjoying fireworks and decorating their houses with traditional lamps – dewas - and beautiful Rangoli designs to welcome the goddess Lakshmi.

This term, Year 3 had a very special morning where they learned all about the festival of Diwali. They heard the story of Rama and Sita and learned how Hindus celebrate during the festival period. Year 3 pupil **Rivan** is a practising Hindu, and his mum (who works at the Senior School!) paid us a visit during the morning to answer any questions the children had. She also provided us with Indian sweets and snacks, dewas, traditional outfits and jewellery to try on, along with other items for the children to explore. Activities included dressing up in shawls, saris and shalwar kameez; acting out the story of Rama and Sita with puppets; designing Rangoli patterns; and a quiz.

Read, Write, Inc. Phonics

This new scheme of phonics was introduced in 2021 and is now embedded within the Pre-Prep academic timetable. Children continue to be assessed on their phonetic knowledge each term and grouped with children of similar abilities across the department. Daily lessons consist of speed sound recognition, spelling and reading

or comprehension tasks. Once again, a Read, Write, Inc. Parents Information Evening was held in September of this year in the school's Studio Theatre. Parents joined us here at school to learn more about the scheme and take part in their own phonics lesson taught by their child's class teacher.

National Poetry Day

Inspired by Robert MacFarlane's Lost and Found, Year 6 pupils marked National Poetry Day on 6th October by producing a beautiful book of kennings - a compressed form of metaphor, originally used in Anglo-Saxon and Norse poetry.

Year 7 pupils wrote poems inspired by **Michael Rosen**'s *No Breathing in Class*, including *Blinking Drama* by **Lula Turner**.

Hundreds of Youngsters in Science Bonanza

Hundreds of primary school pupils from across Gloucestershire converged on Wycliffe College on Wednesday 19th October as the School hosted its annual STEM Day. A range of visiting speakers featured, including TV's Gastronaut, **Stefan Gates**, and the award-wining science communicator and materials scientist, **Dr Jamie Gallagher**.

More than 400 pupils ranging from Years 5 to 8 enjoyed a host of live demonstrations, hands-on interactive workshops and all-round science fun.

Stefan focused on "Science you can eat and fartology" - the science of food and digestion, whilst Jamie spoke on "Nanoinvasion" and the strange alien world that is nanotechnology.

As well as these keynote events, there were sessions by local organisations, including STEMworks, Renishaw, Slimbridge WWT, Bloodhound and the Jenner Institute.

The day is organised by Director of Science, Mr Clements, and Head of Sixth Form, Mr Archer.
Mr Archer said, "It was great to be back with
Wycliffe STEM after two years away and the 12
local schools who joined us have had a terrific time
being thoroughly emersed in science enrichment."

Wycliffe's own pupils got involved too, with Sixth Formers delivering lessons from their own areas of expertise, including sessions on 'flesh eaters', polymers, farming, algorithms, Garage Band, and stop motion animation.








Geography Field Trip



As part of this, they discussed the risks of river fieldwork (as well mitigation measures!), together with different methods of approach and the accuracy of taking readings in a fieldwork setting.
























Prep Art Focus




At the end of November, pupils were excited to be able to showcase their artistic endeavours in an Art Exhibition at the Prep School.


And Year 8 focused on Cubism and the work of Pablo Picasso, with an emphasis on creating depth and distortions.

The William Kentridge exhibition was an impressive and exciting show, with stop-motion videos, tapestries and sculptures, as well as Kentridge's extraordinary large-scale charcoal drawings, spread over a number of

the main galleries at the Royal Academy.

After spending a fascinating hour and a half there, pupils walked down Haymarket to the National Gallery where, as well as enjoying the Freud, they had time to take in some of the world-class permanent collection before re-joining the coach outside the Reform Club on Pall Mall and getting an education in gridlock on the A4 as they left the capital!

We invited the internationally recognised vocal ensemble Apollo5 to Wycliffe. They spent the morning working with VOX and Chapel Choir, workshopping music they already knew and working on ensemble skills.

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Remembering Richard Poulton

Richard Poulton, fifth Headmaster of Wycliffe College (1980-1986) and Honorary Old Wycliffian, passed away on 23rd September 2022, aged 84.

Richard came from a very modest beginning in life. The son of a local parish vicar and a Red Cross volunteer, he grew up in rural south Devon as one of four children in a loving, hard-working and community-spirited family.

Offered a place at Pembroke College, Cambridge aged 16 (to start five years later), on leaving school Richard initially worked as a trainee accountant, and then a brewery labourer, before crossing the Atlantic to spend an eye-opening year studying at Wesleyan University in Connecticut.

He later described the biggest lesson from his time in the US: to value people above everything else - something that helped to shape his kind, caring and thoughtful nature through the rest of his life.

On leaving Cambridge with a first-class honours degree, Richard began his teaching career at Bedford School, and at around that time he met and married his devoted wife, Zara (known as Sally), who was a source of strength and support for him throughout the

Richard became the fifth Headmaster of

Wycliffe College in 1980, where he spent six years working extremely hard to grow and develop the school. This included developing a new girls' boarding house, and numerous other changes to the campus and running of

In 1987, the Secretary of the Headmasters' Conference recommended that he apply for the job as Headmaster of Christs' Hospital in West Sussex, telling him it was "the school for him". Richard brought stability and a clear vision during his tenure, demonstrating his passion for providing the opportunity of an excellent education to children who needed it.

After retiring fully from day-to-day school life, he continued in the field of educational charities, becoming involved with The Inner Cities Young People's Project, and then the All Saints' Educational Trust. In 2008-9, he became Master of the Worshipful Company of Ironmongers.

A man of strong faith and renowned for working hard, Richard provided strong yet calm and sensitive leadership in his schools and organisations. He always took great interest in those around him, making time to guide and encourage pupils, colleagues and family alike.

Cherished by his family and friends he was always a joy to be with, his trademark smile and twinkly eyes sharing his joy with the



people around him. His outlook is perhaps best described by a line in a recent letter to his grandchildren: "Enjoy your lives, and aim to communicate with others, and do good with them and for them."

Richard Poulton was born on 21st June 1938 and died on 23rd September 2022 following a stroke. He is survived by his wife Zara, and children Elizabeth, Anthony and Benedict.
