> Prep School ever better, the Boarding Parents who are often based internationally or far away but still make a huge effort to come for Boarding lunches or supper at the end of exeat weekends or join us online. There have also been some wonderful events, such as the Year 8 and 7s rounders evening and the Coronation picnic we held in the quad. The participation in the community hike last week was lovely to see and we have all agreed we would like to do more of that.

It has also been a year of some sadness – as a country we lost our Queen, there have been personal losses in this community and the world is no less complicated as we look forward. For

this reason, as I look out at the pupils in front of me, I encourage you to be the best versions of yourselves, be the ones who spread hope, joy and have the courage to be the changemakers.

Putting together this speech today, I thought hard about what would bring together all the strands which are important to the young people in front of me - from the youngest in

the audience who will look at this event aspirationally, hard as it is to imagine them completing their final year at Prep School, through to the Year 8s in the room, hours off being new Year 9s.

This has been a cohort who have had a roller coaster of a ride. They were at home for their Summer Term of Year 5, a very restricted start to Year 6 and the Spring Term online learning, and then a large intake of new and wonderful pupils, who had been through the same at their previous schools, arriving into Year 7. There were more new pupils than existing. They then had Year 7 to gel as a group, starting with camping outside my house in the September, they needed to find their 'people', mature themselves and navigate through the world post-covid. I cannot emphasise how proud I am of them with where they have got to sitting in from of me as Year 8s, so completely ready to move on to Year 9. They are an eclectic mix of different characters with huge strengths and talent and will certainly be the changemakers I referred to earlier.

Last year I spoke about maps and adventure -this year it revolves around the Fig Tree. I read a book back in October which resonated with me:

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'The Island of Missing Trees' by Elif Shafak which told part of the story from the prospective of a Fig. As my own understanding deepened, I realised that the Fig could teach us so much. With 73,000 species of trees on our planet, the Fig is particularly notable, and through the tales, symbolic references and cultural importance, this tree encompasses our Prep School core values of respect, responsibility, empathy and resilience along with our vision statement of a pioneering spirit and global citizenship.

A proud member of the great Mulberry family of Moracaea figs can be found across a vast geography - from California to Portugal and Lebanon,

from the shores of the Black Sea to the hills of Afghanistan and the valleys of

In ancient Greek mythology, the fig tree was seen as a symbol of abundance and fertility. In the Bible, it is a symbol of peace and prosperity and specifically in the New Testament, where it is used as metaphor for faith and spiritual growth. In Turkish culture, the fig tree represents hospitality and generosity. The world's major civilisations - the Egyptians, Greeks and Romans all considered it a sacred tree.

In Hinduism, the fig tree is considered sacred and is associated with the God Vishnu. It is also believed to be a symbol of enlightenment and knowledge.





In Buddhism, the fig tree is known as the Bodhi tree, under which the Buddha is said to have attained enlightenment. The Prophet Muhammed said that the fig was the tree he wanted to see in heaven.

I am very proud of our diverse community with pupils from across the world, from different parts of the UK, Europe and with many varied life experiences. Developing our understanding of how the world connects, what it is to understand different perspectives, but, far more importantly what is the same and similar in each and every one of us.

Our association with Round Square has given rise for opportunities for pupils from the Nursery Class to Year 8. We hosted our first postcard, which our Boarders delivered, to celebrate random acts of kindness day - 100 pupils from 5 continents were involved, The Year 6 Geographers connected with a school in Sao Paulo as part of their Brazil unit, the English Department collaborated with Trins School in India with Year 7 writing poems based on the theme of 'Peace' - there was a vote in both schools with the top three poems chosen written by Lula Turner, Emily Cooper and Michelle Tahir (all Year 7).

Our international food nights with the Boarders have been popular, with the favourite probably being Katsu Curry! Our Religious Studies Subject leaders visited a mosque, and the last Discovery unit for the Year 8s was our 'Questions of Faith' workshop, with the chance to discuss and open our thoughts to a range of ideas and beliefs with particular mention to John Boake for his deep curiosity and wish to learn. Special mention also to Rowan Cooper (Year 7) who has recently been highly commended in the International Schools RS Association essay writing competition.

I would like to hand over to the first of our Heads of School from the Autumn Term this year - Rory Scott and Ayesha Menon.

Enriching our curriculum is an area where we are very proud at the Prep School. Most children from Year 5 to Year 8 and the Pre-Prep visited the Cheltenham Literature Festival - the 8s particularly enjoyed their session with Lucy Strange, and wrote some very engaging Gothic short stories as a result. Standouts include Libby Rowlands, Abigail Casey, Mikey Gittins (Year 8). Design and Technology marble run winners went to the MAD Museum, Court Room Drama this year was superbly represented with notable performances by Yasmin Perez Henandez and Henry Surridge Expeditions Days have taken

Year 3 and 4 pupils along the canal, Year 5 going to Ninja warrior and walking to Selsley, Year 6 learning circus skills and pedal a bike away, Year 7 walking in Standish wood, Mojo Active and the Forest of Dean Sculpture Trail and Year 8 walking from Birdlip, caving and climbing.

Residential trips have been to Hooke Courte for Year 4, York for Year 5, Croft Farm for Year 6, Cornwall for Year 7, and the Brecon Beacons for Year 8. Each of these trips has added to our pupils' view of themselves - they have been pushed outside their comfort zones, helped others, had to show courage and resilience, and sometimes they have had to egg-on teachers too!

For many of the pupils, these are the highlights of their year and part of making their memories which they will take with them. For the Year 8s - Stanley Western went to the very highest rung on the high ropes activity when he was not comfortable with heights, William Bengtsonn came out of his comfort zone when Gorge Walking and jumping down waterfalls and Bella Stokes went to the edge of the highest cliff jump four times and then jumped on the fifth - a true testament of not giving up. Residential trips also provide the opportunity for discovering new skills and passions in our pupils - Laurence Williams holds the stone skimming mastery prize!

During a visit to the newly opened Renishaws STEM Education Centre, Mr Stone asked what skills employers were most looking for - and the answer was communication skills, resilience, and a self-motivation to learn and improve.

Communication skills is an area where our Discovery programme comes into its own - opportunities to research, present, debate and work in collaborative groups. Year 7 took part in our first Model United Nations unit debating the merits of fast food and if it should be banned for U13s, and showcases have provided the opportunity for pupils to share with parents and guests what they have been working on. Standouts include:

Year 6 Passion Projects sharing presentations with guests on a host of subjects from surfing to the History of Arsenal FC to British Goats (I learnt a lot!). They have also, as part of the

Sustainability Unit, held a conversation for one minute with visiting guests about the issue of plastics in our oceans.

The Year 6 entrepreneurship unit 'make £5 grow' culminated in a fair just before Christmas. There were fabulous projects such as wooden engraved signs, photo keyrings, smoothies, and vinyl record clocks, to name a few recognition to Lottie Heath for her marketing of her product - even if we found out that two weeks later the 'squidgies' exploded and to Casper Lee and Pearce Sun who realised that £10 only goes so far when you are buying bacon for 100 people!

As part of the Discovery Programme, pupils have also learnt about the principles of flight from MOD engineers and the Cotswold Flying Club - who even brought their simulator in - the outstanding Year 8 was George Blenkinsop, who won the competition and a glider flight!

In Language lessons, some Year 6s and 7s have connected with pen pals in a school near Paris. They have written letters, by hand and created a padlet sharing information about themselves. We also celebrated the first languages Spelling Bee with the winning House being Scott!





Years 5 and 7 completed their English Speaking Board exams this year with particular mention to Sylvie Digby (Year 5), Lula Turner and Seraphine Mossiman (both Year 7) for achieving distinctions and a team of Year 7s visited Marling School twice for a Public Speaking competition. Year 7 also got through to the Youth Speaks Final (a Rotary Club event) where Seraphine Mossiman, Angus Newland and Leo Benn debated the merits of Plastic in front of a full house.

Visiting poet Spoz ran a workshop during the Wycliffe Literature Festival and Haniya Lamkin Berry, Isabella Maida Doyle, and Libby Rowlands in Year 8 all exhibited excellent rapping skills! I would like to thank Mrs Patten for her exceptional work leading English for the last four terms and wish her luck as she returns to Malaysia.

When the Indonesian island volcano Krakatoa erupted in 1883, the waves it sent forth crashed into Bantam, some 50 kilometres away in western Java, and flattened the forest for more than 300 meters inland. All that remained standing were tall fig trees, bare branches reaching skyward.

Back on Krakatoa there was no trace of life. Much of the island had vaporised, and what was left was buried under a 60-meter-deep blanket of ash. Yet before long, several species of fig trees grew there too. They had arrived as seeds spread by birds and bats. They soon produced figs that drew in more flying animals, which in time carried the seeds of dozens of other tree species. And so, from black lava, a forest grew anew.

Learning is like this - there are things which we find difficult and having the strength and resilience to complete something when in that space is one of the areas which we have and shall be continuing into next year, focussing on.

At this stage it is important to congratulate our EAL pupils - some of them arrive here with very little English and then become more and more confident in a relatively short period of time. They often help each other out, and I would like to thank Kevin Xiao for being Hugo Wu's shadow and helping him find his way and translating so much in these last few weeks and Hugo for being Kevin's eyes as his glasses floated off down the river when canoeing on the residential! I would also like to make mention of Lucas Diaz Cuadrado for his resilience - in boarding, learning English and some really tough times - and yet he has remained such a positive and kind member of our Year 8 and his writing progress has been exceptional. Ava Lai is also noted for arriving in Year 7 speaking very limited English and then, by this week in her Encompass Presentation showing such confidence in public speaking.

We say goodbye to Mrs Davis who has helped so many pupils with their EAL lessons and support – as well as teaching languages, Design and

Technology and sharing her love of dance! I would also like to thank Mrs Reid who has been a 1:1 specialist teacher in the Learning Centre - an inspirational woman who has helped many of our pupils.

As ecologists are learning more about trees, we are now clear that each tree is linked to a neighbouring tree by an underground network of fungi that resembles the neural networks in the brain. In one study it is shown that a Douglas fir that insects had injured appeared to send chemical warning signals to a ponderosa pine growing

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nearby. The pine tree then produced defence enzymes to protect against the insect. Similarly, in other studies, trees have been known to share nutrients at critical times to keep each other healthy.

This knowledge that trees share information and respond to the need of the whole forest is teamwork at its best!

A tree has a thousand ears in all directions. The munching of caterpillars as they eat holes in leaves, the buzzing of passing bees, the churring of a beetle's wings, the soft gurgling of water columns breaking inside twigs. Plants can pick up vibrations, and many flowers are shaped like bowls to better trap sound waves, some of which are too high for the human ear. In the Indian state of Meghalaya, the most rain-soaked inhabited place on Earth, the aerial roots of Ficus elastica fig trees into living nets that prevent landslides and living bridges that save lives when monsoon rains turn streams into raging torrents.

Some of these bridges are thought to be centuries old. By contrast, steel suspension bridges last just a few decades. Bangalore-based architect

Sanjeev Shankar says fusing fig roots with steel bridges could create stronger, longer-lasting hybrid structures. He also thinks people in other countries could use the living roots of their own local Ficus species to create structures that build resilience to extreme weather.
























DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY

Chris Akpakwu (Year 6), Corey Sharpe


(Year 6), Edward Hill (Year 5) and Sammy Hughes (Year 5).

RELIGIOUS STUDIES

Religious Studies has a broad remit, and discussion is at the heart of developing and challenging ideas and viewpoints.

The knowledge and content covered across each year group is broad and covers various religious and nonreligious views. Pupils are given space to share their perspectives, listen to others, and then reconsider their ideas. Religious stories can bring out themes of how we should live our lives, be thoughtful and bring a sense of awe and wonder. In Year 5, pupils investigated where the Bible came from and then studied Buddhist and Jewish beliefs and worship. Class lessons challenged pupils, helping them gain new perspectives on these religious practices.

Year 6 pupils enjoyed Hindu stories, followed by how religions use the arts to express themselves. They also considered what people of faith believe happens when people die.

In Year 8, pupils discussed miracles and also whether near-death experiences reveal the idea of an afterlife. These are just some rich topics pupils can learn about and discuss. In the spring term, subject leaders in Year 7 and Year 8 went to the Birmingham Central Mosque to discover how people of the Islamic faith worship and what they

believe. It gave them all a massive sense and understanding of this faith and was a worthwhile experience. In Year 7, Rowan Cooper entered the essay competition held by ISRA (Independent Schools Religious Association), considering whether 'religion makes you less selfish', and the judges commended his effort. Overall, a great year of study and investigation.

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SCIENCE

During STEM Saturday, Year 8 pupils learnt about principles of flight with an RAF engineer and made balsa kit gliders.

Pupils had the opportunity to talk to an engineer who has worked on Airbus and with Dowty.

In Science, Year 3 and 4 pupils learnt about electricity, and built simple series circuits. They learnt that a circuit needs to have a power source, wires and must be a complete, unbroken circuit, to

work. They then experimented with a range of components like motors and noisy buzzers!

Year 8 pupils willingly dissected an eyeball as part of their topic on Light. They explored the internal sections, including the vitreous humour and the lens.










SCIENCE WEEK

FOREST SCHOOL

The aim of Forest School is to support the development of the relationship between children and the natural world, providing them with the space and environment in which to explore and discover.

At the start of the academic year pupils in Forest School collected blackberries, picked pears, apples and plums from the trees, and observed the changes in the seasons and colours. They were creative too, painting leaves, sticks and trees using autumnal colours and using clay and natural resources to make animals and tree faces.

Year 3 enjoyed their Forest School trip to Copsegrove Farm. The day had an 'Italy and the Romans' theme, relating to this term's humanities topic. In teams, the children made their own woodland frames and then created a Roman mosaic inside using natural items found in the woods; they
