




Pupils from Year 6 and 8 visited Regency Retirement Home in Stonehouse to get to know older people and find out about the past.

Duke of Edinburgh Training Walks

On Saturday 20th January, I helped supervise a training morning for Bronze DofE pupils, as part of my Gold level 'Volunteering' section.

Half of the morning was spent covering First Aid, then groups discussed emergency scenarios that they might come across on their expeditions and how they could deal with them. The other half of the morning was spent on camp craft, which involved learning how to put up tents and cook safely using the Trangia stoves, in preparation for final expeditions. The following day the participants navigated independently in teams on a route starting and finish at Cam Long Down, in windy but very bright weather.

On Sunday 4th February, a Silver and Gold day walk took place on Sugar Loaf Mountain in Wales, in which I took part. We arrived at the start of our route at around 11 am and the walk took about three to four hours. It involved hiking through woodland, by rivers, and up very steep exposed mountain side.

The weather started off quite sunny and clear but became progressively colder, wetter, and windier as we made it up the mountain - it was so windy at the top that it felt as if we'd be blown away! This walk was a chance to practise navigation skills, including using the compass and identifying key landmarks on the map to determine our next steps.









Year 9 Enterprise Morning

Pupils were asked to design a product that would help to reduce plastic waste in the local area and/or around the planet.

Year 9s had two hours to come up with an idea, decide how to market and finance it and then create and practice a pitch. They then presented to the other groups.

Pupils worked in groups of six to eight, often with pupils they had not previously worked with. New team dynamics had to be tried out and working patterns agreed. Ideas had to be exchanged and voted upon.

Year 9s greatly enjoyed this highly self-directed task, increasingly

moving from staff support to deciding on their own project structure and distribution of tasks.

During evaluation it was evident that pupils had learnt different things. Some told us that they realised they needed to support each other in the team and to work closely to finalise their ideas. Others that they found an accumulation of ideas led to an eventual higher quality outcome.

Paul Woodhouse from GFirst LEP came and judged the ideas and presentations.

The winning team were **Charlie W**, **Harry B**, **Henrietta V**, **Rory S**, **Rowan G** and **Sophie N**.

This event is always one of the highlights of the school year, and very much anticipated, the Senior school community has the opportunity to celebrate the diversity in cultures we have at our school.



Trier Trip




