years), Mrs Sue Phillips from Ivy Grove (21 years) and Mrs Nicky Murray from Ward's (11 years), Mrs Clare Manning from Business and Economics, Mr Richard Taylor as Director of Finance and Operations, Mrs Christine Lunn and Mr William Hart after maternity cover roles respectively as a teacher of Mathematics and as Head of Drama, Mrs Rosie Mason our visiting LAMDA teacher, **Dr Matt Smith** after five years as a transformational Housemaster of Ward's, teacher of Biology and - latterly -Senior Housemaster, Mrs Bobbie Miller after five-and-a-half years as our International Universities Co-ordinator, Mrs Elizabeth **Dytham** who has packed into her six years separate spells as Housemistress of Haywardsend and of Ivy Grove, as well as her 'day job' as Head of Learning Support and leader of the perennially popular Cookery activity, Mr Edd Crownshaw after ten years' teaching Physics, the polymath and polyglot Mr Darren Lester after twelve years in Modern Languages, Mrs Manuela **Bray** after seventeen years in Modern Languages, Mrs Caroline Ractcliffe - our Senior Exams Invigilator - after nineteen years here, and Mr Sean Dunne our Deputy Head (Academic), also after nineteen years.

A great many of us have cause to be exceptionally grateful to **Mr Dunne** in one way or another but I would single out especially anyone who has completed a BTEC (we – led by Mr Dunne - were one of the very first independent schools to realise that BTECs were a good idea some fifteen years or so ago), anyone who has benefitted from the improved consistency and quality of our teaching in recent years, and anyone who has enjoyed the resurgence in General Knowledge competitions, both inter-School and inter-House.

So, please, before we move on, could I ask you to join me in saluting publicly the extraordinary contribution to the College both of Mr Dunne individually and also of all of those other members of staff that I have just mentioned.

Of course in many ways the most important "farewells" today are to our 'Class of 2024' Year 13 leavers. I have to tell you all that when it came – at the end of March – to writing your final School Reports, I was left reflecting not just on how much you have all achieved but also on how much I simply like so many of you. I am extraordinarily proud of the people that you have become and of the part that Wycliffe has played in making you the human beings that you are. And I look forward very much to raising a glass to your (very bright) futures at your Leavers' Ball this evening.

Sophia has continued to be a young woman of significant substance and intellect, offering a range of carefully considered and strongly expressed opinions on areas that we might wish to improve as a school and proving a supremely reliable back-up and support for Jonty. And Logan has been the epitome of what someone around here calls being a "radiator" (rather than a "drain"),

Leading your peer group have been our three senior pupils: Jonty Jones (Ward's), as Head of School, and Sophia Grasl (Loosley Halls) and Logan Fitzpatrick (Robinson) as his two Deputies. Aside from leading the boys of Ward's to yet another success in the General Knowledge competition and captaining the inter-School team too, Jonty has proved himself to be immensely capable in the 'top job', developing that essential ability to lead through others, making an extraordinary range of contributions across the School and displaying relentless stamina and

Please could I ask all three of them to come up and allow me to present them – as your leaders of the school community - with a small token of my personal thanks for all that they have contributed to Wycliffe this academic year.

As the Media pointed out to us repeatedly, grades in summer 2023 were intended to be a 're-set' back to pre-Covid levels with it being far harder to secure top grades than it had been in the previous three years.

And the impact of this shift in approach was certainly felt here at Wycliffe.

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Year 13 leavers opened up a wide range of opportunities from Degree courses in Medicine, Veterinary Science and Law (to name but a few), to professional Rugby contracts, Scholarships at Universities in the United States, a range of different Apprenticeships, and/or amazing 'gap year' projects.

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Nevertheless, we were still very pleased to see more than half of all A Level grades (plus BTEC equivalents) secured at A\*, A or B. Four pupils - from a year-group of 76 girls and boys - earned AAB: Hannah Denning, Rosie Palk, Lucy McKerrow (all Lampeter), and Sophie Izon (Collingwood). And, even more exceptionally, Orla Wright (Haywardsend), Murdo Matthews (Collingwood) and Daisy Hartson (Collingwood) all secured A\*AB, Zakh Mamayev (Robinson) was awarded A\*AAB whilst Sarah Zhou (Lampeter) earned a 'full house' of A\*A\*A\* in Economics, Mathematics and History. BTEC highlights included Double Distinctions (starred) in Sport for **Kathryn Burton** (Loosley Halls) and in Business for Charlotte Robbins (Collingwood). As a result, Year 13 leavers opened up a wide range of opportunities

Veterinary Science and Law (to name but a few), to professional Rugby contracts, Scholarships at Universities in the United States, a range of different Apprenticeships, and/or amazing 'gap year' projects.

At GCSE, pretty much one-third of all grades were awarded at 7, 8 or 9 (previously A\*/A) and almost eight of every ten grades was at 5 or higher. On an individual level, Abigail Opaleye (Collingwood) and Olivia Larkman (Lampeter) both earned an 8 or a 9 (formerly A\*) in ten of their subjects, Cathy Chow (Haywardsend) did the same in nine subjects, Sebastian Forrest (Ward's) in eight and Katherine Cox (Ivy Grove) in seven. Among our international Boarders, Development Year pupil Naiara Lasa Martín-Almagro (Loosley Halls) managed to earn an incredible six 8s and 9s after just ten months of study.

Turning next to some of the year's other pupil highlights ...

We entered our usual wide range of national competitions in Mathematics and the Sciences with some impressive successes in all age groups. Two major overseas trips saw groups of 30+ pupils head to The Azores for Geography in the autumn and also to Paris for French in March. A young Year 11 Debating team had an outstanding year, winning through local and regional rounds of the ESU Mace Debating competition as only the second Wycliffe team to do so in the past decade. Five pupils represented us for the first time at the annual Round Square International Conference, held for this academic year in Nairobi (Kenya) and exploring - as its theme - the many ways that the continent of Africa has evolved in





deservedly ran out winners overall. The 'best performance' award that night was presented to Jenrola Oyewumi (Year 13, Ivy Grove) whose vocal performances all year long have been of an astoundingly impressive quality. House Song was won by the girls of Haywardsend. And in Drama, The Wizard of Oz proved an inspired choice for January's school production, backed up by some brilliant casting decisions: the triumvirate of Tin Man, Scarecrow and Lion (respectively Jacob Cheetham, Year 12, Robinson; Melody Benn, Year 10, Lampeter; Abigail Opaleye, Year 12, Collingwood) were all outstanding, as were the two Witches, Madison Charnley-Heaton (Year 13, Ivy Grove) and

in the 21st century. Sophie Newman (Year 9, Lampeter) won the annual Creative Writing competition which this year took Gothic Writing as its theme. An array of high-quality Year 9 Projects have been submitted in the past month, with subjects ranging from manatees and border-collies, to World War II, Artificial Intelligence, identity in Art, and crime-scene pathology. And – among other prizes – it has been a bitter-sweet moment in recent days to see 'The Jason Murphy award for Photography' presented for the first time in memory of our much-missed friend and colleague, with Annie Fang (Year 12, Lampeter) its first recipient.

Activity at all levels of the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme has remained incredibly busy with many of the year's weekends being dedicated to all sorts of expeditions across different counties and countries. As for the Combined Cadet Force, we had once again a Year 10 entry in the 35-mile Ten Tors event on Dartmoor in May, March's Weekend Exercise included a successful Biennial Inspection and Abigail Opaleye (Year 12, Collingwood) was appointed as a Lord Lieutenant's Cadet for Gloucestershire and went on to take over the CsM position from Jonty Jones (Year 13, Ward's) in February.



In Music, Melody Cheung (Year 13, Loosley Halls) earned a Grade 8 pass with Distinction on Piano to accompany the Grade 8 that she already held on Harp and Abigail Opaleye (Year 12, Collingwood) earned Grade 8 with Distinction on the Recorder. The biennial House Music competition was characterised by an incredibly wide array of instruments including harp and guzheng (a traditional Chinese plucked zither) and Collingwood

Maisie Tomlinson (Year 13, Lampeter), and Grace Gosling (Year 13, Haywardsend) carried the performance as a marvellous Dorothy.

In Sport, there have been regional and/or national successes in Fencing and Shooting as well as the outstanding achievements of our Squash players winning national titles at Under 16 and Under 18 level for the boys, as well as a 3rd place-finish for the

Under 16 girls. Levels of participation in, and commitment to, all of our major team sports have been hugely praiseworthy and I have been especially pleased to see the continued growth and success in Boys' Basketball and Girls' Cricket. Rowing has again seen extraordinary levels of hardearned achievement, with both A and B Girls' Quads winning their events at the National Schools' Regatta at Eton Dorney and then victories in the Single and the Quad at Women's Henley just two weeks ago. Let's not jinx Henley Royal Regatta since it is still going on! \* Individually, international recognition has come the way of Rugby players, Netballers, Rowers, Basketballers and Squash players. In Athletics, last week's Sports Day saw team triumphs for the girls of Lampeter (for the Juniors) and Collingwood (at Senior level) with the boys of Robinson and Ward's

winning the equivalent Boys' categories. On an individual level, our recent endof-year Sports Dinners saw the principal awards go to Laila Howse (Year 13, lvy Grove), Ateca Smith (Year 13, Lampeter) and Aoife Wright (Year 12, Haywardsend) for the girls and to Sacha Cooper (Year 13, Collingwood), Ryan Gwidzima (Year 12,

Haywardsfield) and Harry Hogg (Year 12, Haywardsfield) for the boys.

\*As things turned out, our Girls' A and B Quads raced each other later that afternoon in the Semi-Finals leading to our A Quad going on to the Final the following day and then winning the event!

And so, in closing ...

In 1982, in the final page of the book that he wrote to mark Wycliffe's first centenary, **George Loosley** (the 3rd Headmaster) wrote: "Wycliffe has always shown ... [] ... 'elasticity' in adapting to changing circumstances. Yet never has its freedom been in question. It has retained its ideals, always willing to learn from others but never unquestioningly to conform...".

That 'elasticity' in changing circumstances was epitomised by the College's 7th Head, Mr David Prichard, who died just a few

months back at the age of 89, and who was himself responsible for leading the College at a very difficult time in the late 1990s, driving Wycliffe forward to build both Wycliffe Hall and also the co-ed Sixth Form Boarding House, Loosley Halls. Bold and brave decisions that protected and preserved the College's future at that particular time.

I do hope very much indeed – in line with Loosley's words getting on for almost fifty years ago - that Wycliffe will continue to retain its values and ideals in the face of the challenges that the next few years will bring and will be able to operate with the necessary 'elasticity' so to do. I am sure that it will.

And I wish my hugely talented and capable successor Mr Christian San José and his lovely family every good fortune and happiness in leading the College in this, the next chapter of its proud history.

Thank you everyone for your support for me these past nine years, enjoy the rest of the day especially the Leavers' Service in Chapel a little bit later on, and thank you



# A LEVEL AND BTEC RESULTS

Our pupils, parents and staff once again celebrated A Level results that reflect the diverse nature of the community at Wycliffe.

More than eight out of every ten grades were achieved at A\*-C, and actual A\*-B performance was 25% better than expectations.

A range of superb individual achievements is being lauded, including that of **Eloise Etherington** whose four A\*s in Maths,

Further Maths, Chemistry and Physics have secured her place at Cambridge to read Natural Sciences. Another exceptional achiever was **Aidan Kitching**, whose A\*A\*A in Maths, Philosophy and Ethics, and History,

mean that he is off to Warwick to study PPE (Politics, Philosophy and Economics).

Among the 28 subjects available in the Sixth Form at Wycliffe, Mathematics was the most popular A Level this summer (studied by more than one-quarter of all leavers), with Psychology and Business similarly popular. Continued commitment to, and support for, so-called 'creative subjects' saw significant numbers of pupils do well across Art, Design and Technology, Drama/Theatre Studies, Film Studies and

Music, as well as the BTEC in Digital Media and four different Modern Languages.

Wycliffe's outgoing Head, Mr Nick Gregory, commented: "I am exceptionally proud of this outstanding group of pupils and of this extremely pleasing set of results, both A Level and BTEC. Our ambition is to instil in our pupils a "pioneering spirit" and to encourage them to take their place in the world as "global citizens": they all leave Wycliffe very well prepared indeed for the exciting futures that await them."

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# **BIOLOGY**

From the study of living organisms to the exploration of biochemistry, Biology offers a diverse range of topics that can captivate anyone.

No subject could be more fascinating than the study of life itself.

Some of our A Level pupils like nothing better than to spend hours away taking an in-depth look at the biochemistry of a protein molecule. Others prefer the endless complexities provided by the study of life at the genetic level. However, whatever the personal predilection of the pupil, it is the opportunity to study living things in their natural environment that never fails to stimulate a biological mind.

At Wycliffe, we are blessed to have considerable natural beauty on our doorstep; as we aim to inspire pupils and nurture a passion for Biology, it would be a shame not to make the most of this resource. For this reason, we make an annual pilgrimage to explore a local nature



spot in the name of science. While there, our pupils painstakingly catalogue the different living things they find, assessing the area's rich biodiversity and gaining a deeper appreciation of the abundance but fragility of our environment. While gaining this understanding, our pupils can hone their skills in important biological techniques such as kick sampling in the stream or using keys to identify the observed flora and fauna.

It can be arduous doing Biology in the sun, but the status associated with being in the group that identifies the greatest number of different species, and therefore claims the prestigious Wycliffe Biology Trophy, certainly focuses everyone's efforts.

At some point, there's inevitably a great clamour of excited noises that means someone's netted a fish!

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# BUSINESS AND ECONOMICS

The Business and Economics department has experienced another eventful year, marked by numerous educational trips and activities.

In March, Year 10 Business pupils embarked on their annual trip to Cardiff, visiting Cardiff Castle and the Principality Stadium. At the Castle, pupils gained insights into its operations as a business, learning about marketing strategies and adaptation to changing circumstances. The afternoon at the Principality Stadium provided a comprehensive tour, covering various facilities and exploring event management, technology utilisation, and pricing strategies for diverse events.

Year 13 Economics and Business pupils attended the Tutor2u Gradebooster revision conference at Cribbs Causeway in March. They participated in intensive workshops led by experienced examiners to enhance their subject knowledge and exam technique. Year 12 and Year 13 Business

A Level pupils have enjoyed separate visits to the Morgan Motor Company and Weston's Cider. They could see contrasting production methods in action and learn about how the two different businesses compete in their respective markets.

Additionally, Year 13 pupils toured Stroud Brewery in November, focusing on corporate social responsibility, ethics, and sustainability.

BTEC Business course pupils demonstrated their practical skills by organising the Sixth-Form social as part of their Unit four study. This hands-on experience served as the foundation for their written assignments, including a thorough evaluation of individual and team performance.

Throughout the year, the department continued to offer revision support sessions for GCSE and A Level pupils. A Level Economics pupils particularly appreciated Mr Axford's dedication, as he provided additional tutorials during holidays and weekends.

As the academic year concludes, the department bids farewell to Mrs Manning and Mr Bennett, who have departed from Wycliffe. Looking ahead, the department eagerly anticipates welcoming their successors, Mr Areington and Mr Bassan, in September.

# **CHEMISTRY**

The study of Chemistry gives you the tools to understand the world around you and the power to influence the matter that surrounds you.

Each year, Sixth-Form Chemists take the lead on STEM day, teaching children from local primary and Prep schools how Chemistry is all around them. This year was no different, and the Year 12s and 13s taught the visiting pupils about the importance of Polymers in everyday life and helped them make some slime and bouncy balls!

In November, alongside mock exams for Year 11, four pupils from Year 9 – Year 11 (Athina M-V, Abigail C, Henry S, Conrad M) entered the RSC's Top of the Bench competition where they were tasked with putting together an infographic on the uses of rare metals in mobile phones.

One judge commented: 'Thank you for making a poster about resource scarcity. We really liked that you made the most of the online platform with some visual effects and got a good deal of public engagement. It made the poster eye-catching.'

The Spring Term was filled with more exams for almost all year groups, and we were impressed with the drive and resilience of our pupils. Most notably, Year 12 Chemists, along with one Year 11 and one Year 13, took part in the Annual Chemistry Olympiad run by the Royal Society of Chemistry.

This is a challenging paper designed to stretch the most, and we were very proud that several pupils achieved awards (Abi O – Bronze, Eva C – Bronze, Henry B – Bronze, Kate C – Bronze, Annie F – Silver and Will W – Silver).





The Summer Term was full of hard work and preparation for Year 11s and Year 13s as they faced their external exams, and there was a truly scholarly atmosphere in the department during this time. Years 9, 10 and 12 also kept progressing with the curriculum and completed lots of exciting practical work. Finally, we congratulate the following pupils on achieving awards in the Cambridge Chemistry Challenge: Henry B – Copper, Julian S – Silver and Annie F – Gold. Annie's score puts her in the top 10% of pupils who took this paper and deserves a huge well done.

# DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY

It has been another exciting year for Design and Technology, which has seen substantial changes within the department while continuing to enhance pupils' experience and outcomes by fostering innovation and creativity.





During the 2023-2024 academic year, the department has undergone notable changes in both the curriculum and vision under the leadership of our new head, Mr. Hayes. These modifications have particularly impacted on the Year 9 pupils, who have been the first to engage with several new and improved projects. They honed their woodworking skills in the box/ desk organiser project, learnt the soldering techniques in their electronic project and concluded the term by applying principles of streamlining and aerodynamics in their Gravity Race Car project. This project also emphasised sustainability and culminated in an exhilarating race event, providing a memorable and dynamic end to the year.

In October, the Year 12 pupils embarked on their annual trip to the Design Museum

and the Science Museum in London. The excursion was particularly enjoyable this year, with an increased number of pupils opting to study Design and Technology. They explored the Anti-Furniture Exhibition and concluded their visit with the captivating 'Email is Dead' exhibition, where they took photos on cloud-like beds alongside large-scale paper aeroplanes. Over the year, they refined their knowledge and skills, completing their lamp project and engaging in an architecturebased mini coursework. Both the Year 10 and 12 pupils have begun their NEA coursework, tackling various intriguing design challenges.

The Year 11 and Year 13 pupils have dedicated their academic year to completing their coursework, resulting in a diverse array of exciting and creative projects that showcased the skills they have acquired throughout their studies. Notable among these are Oliver Grant in Year 13, who crafted a bespoke coffee table for his grandmother, and Tsz Hin Mok (Jason), who produced a high-quality trophy case for Haywardsfield House, set to be installed over the summer. Additionally, in Year 11, Hoi Yan Wan (Dalphina) and Ka Yi Lee (Kaylee) produced astounding products to raise funds for their chosen charity while Jamie Davies produced an attractive Dome Garden Office for his STEM project.





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# **DIGITAL ARTS**

It has been an exciting year for the Digital Arts department, ranging from high-quality short filmmaking to a brand-new CTEC course.

The Year 13 A Level Film Studies pupils returned from their summer break having shot their raw footage, ready to edit their original 5-minute short films. Immediately, it was evident that the care and skill had gone into producing these over the summer months (shot worldwide), and the product was of the highest standards. Stand-out examples include:

- 'What Ifs and Maybes' by Fami Adesina (a powerful cautionary tale about teenage choices and multiple pathways).
- 'Everlasting Love' by **Madison Charnley-Heaton** (a warm-hearted story of a mature couple who reconnect later in life).
- 'Pressured' by **Maddy Small** (a story of regret and acceptance revolving around friendship and loss).
- 'Is It?' by Masha Koberman (a hilarious dark comedy with a twist revolving around paranoia).

A number of these have been entered into the 'Eduqas Moving Image Awards 2024' (in partnership with the BFI), which recognises and rewards the UK's Most Talented Young filmmakers, in which previous pupils have also enjoyed success, and we hope to see that replicated this year also.

As is now an annual occurrence for Wycliffe, pupils from within the department and from the wider School entered their independent photography into the "2024 Gloucestershire Young Photographers Competition". Notable works (all of which were selected for public display) included shots by Isaac Pei ('Looking Forward'), Jollie Wong ('Untitled'), Leonardo Simonetti Whitford ('ISS'), and Annie Fang Li ('Yamzhog Yumco') – who has also been awarded our inaugural 'Jason Murphy Prize for Photography' for this very photo.

We also very much look forward to next year, when Mr Beamish and Mr Waring (whom we welcomed into the department this year) will roll out the 'Wycliffe Podcasting Club', an exciting opportunity for budding broadcasters, writers, graphic designers, and those who love films, media, and video games.

















# **ENGLISH**

### The Debating Team reached the final and gained the judges' commendation.

It has been a very busy year in English; in December, our Year 11 GCSE Literature pupils attended an innovative performance of *A Christmas Carol*, our 19th century exam text, at the Theatre Royal in Bath. One actor performed all the roles within

the novel; our pupils were struck by the sheer technical skill needed for such an intense performance. This was followed by a return visit to Bath in January for our Year 11 pupils at the Poetry Live event. Of particular note was Owen Sheers's moving performance of his poem 'Mametz Wood' and John Agard's lively

and emphatic

performance of his poem 'Checking Out Me History'. In February, we took Year 11 Literature pupils to Stratford to participate in small group workshops led by RSC actors; the focus was on key scenes from Macbeth, our Shakespeare text. The scene we chose to focus on came up in the exam in May, so our pupils were very well prepared to answer the question!

Ms Attwell and Ms Browne continued the Shakespearean theme with a visit to the Sam Wanamaker Theatre in London with our A Level pupils to see an innovative production of *Othello*, an exciting viewing of one of their exam texts.

Lower down the school, Year 9 excelled in the *Poetry by Heart* competition in March, with each pupil choosing a poem



to recite, with a focus on clarity and meaning. Mr Dunne judged the Wycliffe final; the quality of the performances was most impressive. The Wycliffe finalists sent a video of their performances to the Poetry by Heart judges for the national competition, who awarded them 'highly commended'.

Ms Birkett ran our Creative Writing competition, inviting author Bryony Pearce to meet with our pupils and work on their writing skills. Bryony returned in May to judge the final competition in front of

pupils and their parents; the standard of writing was incredible. **Sophie Newman** (Year 9) won first place with her H.P. Lovecraft inspired tale; however, both **Grace Palmer-Gilman** and **Emily Thomas** 

came close with their Gothic narratives.

Creative writing will be a key focus next year; Mrs Wheeler will be pioneering our creative writing club, encouraging creativity and a love of language.

teams of Sixth Formers. Jason Cai, Isobel Carrick and Daisy Muna (all Year 11s) held the floor brilliantly, and gained the judges' commendation but did not get through this time.

The year finished with a sunny visit to the Slad Valley for **Mrs Attwell's** Year 10 group, who have been studying Laurie Lee's novel, *Cider with Rosie*. They spent an afternoon visiting places of significance from the novel, a magical way to celebrate the end of a successful year in the English department.

# **GEOGRAPHY**

### The five-day visit to the Azores was a highlight of the year.

### Trip to Bristol

Our Year 10 Geography pupils visited Bristol to investigate inequalities between different areas. In addition to spending time in Lawrence Hill and Stoke Bishop, pupils visited the Soapworks, Bristol's Temple Quarter (one of the largest regeneration projects in the UK), and Cabot Circus. They did well to maintain good spirits throughout a wet and cold day!

#### The Gower

Year 12 pupils embarked on an engaging field trip to the Gower, where they participated in fieldwork involving costal dunes and beach sediment analysis.

#### The Azores

34 Geography pupils had an adventurous five days in the Azores over October half term.

The group visited several huge calderas (craters formed by collapsed magma chambers), witnessed geothermal activity in the form of hot springs and fumaroles, and walked inside an ancient lava tube deep under the capital city Sao Miguel.

The trip enabled the pupils to appreciate how local people have adapted and benefitted from these extraordinary surroundings, whether cooking food daily in the warm volcanic crater sands, harnessing

geothermal energy from magma under the Islands or simply growing tropical fruits and tea in the rich volcanic soil.

In addition to the spectacular volcanic topography, the pupils also had the opportunity to bathe in several thermal pools set in the natural landscapes. They wandered through a steep river gorge, viewed waterfalls, and visited the dramatic and wild, west coast, where the Atlantic rollers have eroded, wave cut platforms, caves, arches and stacks from the black basalt cliffs!

This was a once in a lifetime experience to visit a remote and dramatic landscape.



# **HISTORY**

This year, our pupils have been involved in a variety of activities and visits.

Year 9 went to the Black Country Living Museum in November to experience life in Victorian times; from legging a canal boat, to visiting Victorian housing and shops, to attending a Victorian school lesson with punishments, through to eating the now famous chips! Pupils over the course of the year also undertook prep tasks that challenged their skills and had them doing role plays, writing poems, designing and even baking.

The GCSE classes had to learn all about North Wales for the Historic Environment element of the course and soon became experts on Welsh castles, bastides, statute law, and the Church. A Level pupils visited Sudeley Castle and Hailes Abbey, as well as a highly productive day at Portsmouth's Historic Royal Dockyards, going behind the scenes at the Mary Rose and even handling rope over 500 years old from the actual wreck.

Mrs Conway and Mrs Halford Scott also discovered the Gloucester History
Festival and heard both Tracy Borman and
Gareth Russell speak. We hope to book
for September 2024 and to take Year 13 to hear Historians speak on our A Level topics.







# **MATHEMATICS**

As always, this has been a busy year in the Mathematics department.

In November, some of our top mathematicians performed brilliantly in the 'invitation-only' Maths Olympiad for Girls. Lisa Dorosheva (Year 12) and Eloise Etherington (Year 13) achieved Distinctions, and Eva Cosway (Year 12), Sophia Grasl (Year 13), Abigail Opalaye (Year 12), and Britney Yang (Year 12) achieved Merits. Eloise also qualified to take part in the British Maths Olympiad, as did Justin Zhu (Year 12), and both achieved Merits.

Throughout the School, we have some very strong mathematics pupils, and we look forward to plenty of certificates in the UKMT Challenges and Kangeroo competitions as they progress through the age groups. In May, Mrs Anastasia Cobbs

(Head of Mathematics, Senior School) joined Ms Caroline Curtis (Head of Mathematics, Prep School) to run a workshop and the UKMT Junior Maths Challenge for the top sets in Years 7 and 8. In November, they also ran the Primary Maths Challenge for pupils in Years 5 and 6. Lots of fun was had with the activities, and pupils enjoyed the challenges. They are more 'puzzle' based than more standard maths 'tests', sometimes allowing different pupils to show their talents. We look forward to welcoming all these budding mathematicians when they arrive in the Senior School in Year 9.

Every year, we welcome a new cohort of international DY pupils from around the

world who bring their diverse experience of studying mathematics. They face the challenge of preparing for an IGCSE in Mathematics in just nine months, and a few of them take the Level 2 Certificate in Further Mathematics. After all the hard work, we get to spend some time doing mathematics that is not on the exam. The challenge of building the platonic solids (and other shapes) from polyhedrons (Challenge: Can you name the biggest shape they built? It had 62 faces).

They also undertook a Business and Mathematics research task, learned about cryptography, and developed teamwork and English skills in an end-of-year Maths quiz.

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We have missed Mrs Lunch, who has been on maternity leave, and we look forward to welcoming her back before September.

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# RELIGIOUS STUDIES

This year in Religious Studies, we have enjoyed a wide range of events and activities both within and beyond the academic department.

In the department, our Sixth Form pupils enjoyed two separate Philosophy and Ethics conferences hosted at Worcester Cathedral and later Wells Cathedral School, featuring renowned academics and specialists in the field, including **Dr Peter Vardy** and **Chris Eyre**, Principal Examiner for Religious Studies.

In addition to this, our Year 10 and 11 GCSE RS pupils had a highly engaging and educational day trip to Bristol to visit a Synagogue then a Mosque, benefitting from the insights of members of local faith communities who generously allowed us

their time and answered pupils' questions with enthusiasm and expertise.

Across the College more broadly, relevant themes from international days were introduced into lessons with Year 12 in November, considering the theme of International Philosophy Day 2024, 'Philosophical Reflection in a Multicultural World', with Year 11 on World Poetry Day in June, informing our learning on Christianity that morning, and with Year 10 in 'Refugee Week' in June, supporting their consideration of issues of poverty and discrimination.

In the Summer Term, Senior School pupils visited the Prep School on the 24th of June for our annual 'Questions of Faith' event with Year 8 pupils, adeptly compered by Mr Steve Arman. As ever, this was full to the brim with fascinating questions and responses, and even finished with a great number of hands still up wanting to ask more!

# **PHYSICS**

The Physics Olympiad was a highlight of the department.

#### Physics Olympiad

Year 12 Physics pupils took part in the British Physics Olympiad (BPhO), a series of annual physics competitions and challenges to encourage the study of physics and recognise excellence in young Physicists. The challenges aim to allow pupils to practice their problem-solving skills and see the real-world potential of physics. This year Esme Devenport achieved a Silver Award and a Bronze award went to Thomas Woollard, Freddie Thomas, Bobby Britto, Eldon Hou, Bella Shute, Kate Cox, Vincent Fan, Edward Chrystal and Blake Mosimann. Well done to all who took part.

Dr Nic Harrigan talking about the potential of quantum computing; Dr Tishtrya Mehta explaining Helioseismology, the science of Earthquakes on the Sun and Dr Anna Ploszajski revealing the world of materials science. Pupil Vincent Fan (Year 12) said, "The session on quantum computing was fascinating as it gave us a vision of the future!".

# Energy from Waste Facility (by Thomas Woollard, Year 12).

"At the start of June, our Sixth Form class had the opportunity to travel down the road to the energy from waste facility at Haresfield. We learned how 190,000 As we entered, we saw a vast tipping bay where lorries would offload the waste into an enormous pit, in which one of two automated claws would then pick it up and place it onto the feeding conveyor where it was burned at nearly 1,000 Degrees Celsius.



Following the steam pipes, we entered the generator room where the high-pressure steam with the smog (smoke) turns a blade that drives a generator, producing electricity (using Fleming's left-hand rule: GCSE Physics!). However, some of the energy was lost to sound (80 dBs), enough to require hearing protection.

Next, we exited the facility to see the small transformer outside and learned that the power is converted (at Ryeford substation near to our Prep School) to Mains Voltage (230V). Above the transformers were three large cooling fans, each 10m in diameter and used to cool the steam before feeding it back into the facility. To round off the tour we returned to the office which had an amazing view of the surrounding Cotswolds.

From this trip we learned how waste can be converted into electricity, inspiring the class to research the topic further.

The class would like to thank **Mr Clements** for organising the trip."



#### Physics in Action

In November, Year 12 pupils attended the Physics in Action study day at Birmingham University. As well as giving pupils a great opportunity to experience the University environment, the day provided a feast of stimulating lectures about different applications of Physics. These included

tonnes of waste each year (including anything we don't recycle at school) is incinerated to produce into energy and to reduce landfill. The energy produced could power nearly 30,000 homes at peak output. We were given an in-depth tour of the facility, showing us the stages of how the waste was converted into energy.

# MODERN FOREIGN LANGUAGES

### French

This has been yet another action-packed year in the French department. Our Christmas party was a great end to the Autumn Term, and we made crêpes in February with military precision and no sign of Nutella on the carpet! France was brilliantly represented at the international fair by Athina Marceau Veron, Gabriel Aragones and Gabriel Friedman and Year 13 enjoyed a meal in March at the Petit Coco Restaurant in Cheltenham. This was a lovely time for us to reflect and prepare for the Year 13 exam season and we will miss our Year 13s dearly.

We have started to see pupils taking more initiative for immersive experiences in France. **Beth Leach** spent a week in France in September working in a restaurant and going à bloc to improve her spoken French. **Melody Benn** will spend some time with a family in France this summer and is so excited about improving her conversational French.

The highlight of the year had to be the Paris trip in March. We took twenty-seven pupils on a 5-night stay and crammed as much in as possible. We did a virtual reality fly view experience of Paris, visited the Musée d'Orsay, used one of the fastest elevators in Europe to go to the top of Tour Montparnasse, visited the Sacré Coeur basilica, walked up the Champs Elysées and visited the Stade de France. There were of course plenty of opportunities for shopping and merch vendors across Paris welcomed our pupils with open arms and elevated prices. These trips always throw up unforeseen opportunities and the one we couldn't miss was having a French choir sing to us. They sang acapella versions of songs and tunes from well-known films, and we all bobbed along to their wonderful voices. This was too much for four Year 10 girls who then joined them in a beautiful rendition of Liberée, Delivrée (Let it Go). We all hope this lives long in the memory of an example of how different cultures, languages and generations can come together and have fun.





#### German

It has been another incredible year in Wycliffe German! We have had a year full of joy and learning!

Highlights included:

- The Oktoberfest German Pop-Up restaurant experience at Stroud Subscripton Rooms for our A Level Germanists and pupils in the Development Year where we enjoyed "Flammkuchen" and "Schnitzel mit Kartoffelsalat".
- The English is not Enough Event in November at which Mr David Binns talked to pupils about the importance of languages, German especially in the world of work.
- The celebration of Athina Marceau Veron's commendation for the Stephen Spender Prize in translation for her translation of "Spiegelbild".
- The Year 9 Christmas Party in December where we taught the Year 9 pupils the Danube Waltz, a traditional waltz which is danced at midnight on New Year's Day in Austria.
- The return of our German exchange celebrated its 35th anniversary this academic year. Pupils spent time building friendships and were excited to visit their friends of the Friedrich Wilhelm Gymnasium Trier in December to enjoy the Christmas markets and time at school together.

### Japanese

Highlights of the 2023-24 academic year in Japanese have included visits by Livreau-Burgess-sensei and Revie-sensei to the Prep School to deliver Japanese taster lessons to Years 6, 7, and 8. We welcomed Inside Japan Tours' representatives to MFL's annual English is not Enough event for Year 9s. A meal out with Sixth Form pupils of Japanese to Kibou (a Japanese restaurant) in Cheltenham. Helping to arrange a visit by pupils from Reitaku High School (a Senior High school in Japan) to the Prep School. Showcasing Japan at the annual International Fair, and as well as preparing our pupils for GCSE and A Level exams in Japanese, always incorporating as much of Japan's unique culture into our curriculum as we can! This includes such activities as Haiku-writing and entering Haiku contests; lots of origami. Making wishes for Tanabata; and watching the Sakura bloom on the cherry blossom tree outside Haywardsend House, the tree given to Wycliffe as part of The Cherry Tree Project. The best highlight of the year was the success of our Year 12 pupil, **Abubakar Sambo**, who was selected as a finalist in the speech category of the Japan Foundation's JaLa Champ Contest. He presented his speech about a Japanese proverb ('Fall down seven times, get up eight') at the Finals Day in London in May and was awarded a runners-up prize. Omedetou gozaimasu, Abubakar!

### Spanish

Year 11s have been busy with exam preparation and have been having weekly one-to-one speaking practices all year up to their oral exam. The Spanish department has been impressed with the progress and confidence the pupils have shown since the start of the year.

This year has been a thrilling one for our Sixth Form, filled with exciting trips. In November, we had a delightful Tapas evening at Spagos, a Tapas bar in Gloucester Quays.

#### Spanish Sixth Form Trip - Madrid 2024

Our very keen Year 12 and Year 13 pupils' Hispanists asked for a Sixth Form Spanish trip, organised and tailored to their very good Spanish level, and that explored many A Level topics firsthand.

We based ourselves in Madrid, and the trip included many activities in the city and day trips to Toledo and Salamanca.

Pupils attended Spanish lessons at Don Quijote Language School, the world leader in Spanish language education. The lessons focused on A Level grammar, Spanish culture, and conversation.

Other activities in Madrid included eating Churros at San Ginés, the oldest churros café. We visited the beautiful Royal Theatre Opera House and the Reina Sofia Museum to see Guernica by Pablo Picasso. We explored Retiro Park on bikes, seeing all the beautiful main sites. We explored Puerto del Sol, Gran Vía, and Plaza Mayor and ate lunch at Mercado San Miguel. There were many options and pupils chose squid, jamón serrano, croquetas and montaditos.

On another day, we visited Toledo, a World Heritage Site by Unesco and a museum city. We started the visit with a zip wire experience over the river Tagus. We then visited the Cathedral, Alcázar, the Church of Santo Tomé, and more.

We also visited the beautiful University city, Salamanca, the Oxford of Spain. We visited the University of Salamanca and Convento de San Esteban and admired the stunning Gothic, Renaissance, and Baroque styles of architecture.

Every day for lunch, pupils ate the typical Spanish Menu del Día, which is a three-course set menu with bread and a drink.

Each region of Spain has its own famous dishes, and we ate at a Galician restaurant and sampled their most famous dish, 'Pulpo a la Gallega.' A Galician-style octopus tapa.

The pupils spoke so much Spanish in many different realia environments; we are very proud of them.



# DEVELOPMENT YEAR AND EAL

This year's Development Year and EAL sets were made up of pupils from Bulgaria, Chile, China (including Hong Kong, Inner Mongolia, Macao), Czech Republic, France, Germany, Japan, Latvia, South Korea, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Russia, Ukraine, and Zimbabwe. A number of greatly valued DY one-termers were replaced in January by a small handful set to take GCSEs in two terms.

Trips have included the Stroud Market and Museum trip for orientation in a nearby town, Lower School EAL visited Stratford upon Avon to round off their project on Shakespeare and the impact he had on the English Language, and of course the Bristol trip: The group crossed Brunel's suspension bridge at Clifton admiring views of the city and the Avon gorge. Later pupils explored Brunel's Steamship Great Britain. The pupils then crossed the harbour on a small open-topped ferry before walking through the town centre

to see such sights as Millennium Square, Queen's Square and St Nicholas Square. The day was topped off by a memorable performance of Dickens' A Christmas Carol at the Hippodrome.

The Oxford trip taking in Pitt Rivers and Ashmolean museums, as well as Balliol College, and the cavernous Norrington room in Blackwell's Bookshop went ahead and the weather threw in some rainbows for us over Broad Street. Lower School EAL also had fun bowling in Stroud where they experienced Fat Toni's pizzas.

A group walk on MAD (Make A Difference)
Day from Painswick Beacon back to School was kept on the programme. As with Sports

As usual pupils were taught in departments across the school and DY pupils took
Cambridge, and Trinity English exams, along with a number of GCSEs (eight in one case) in their first year here.
A number of Sixth Form pupils also received excellent IELTS results in preparation for University. Following last year's pupils' successes in two new
GCSEs trialled at opposite ends of the
English spectrum (English as an Additional Language, and World Literature) we have kept these in the programme.

We are delighted a large number of this year's Development Year pupils are staying to continue their studies here in September 2024 and excited to welcome a larger cohort for the new 2024 DY intake.

# CHAPEL

Throughout the year Chapel life followed its daily pattern of services: of particular note this year was the high standard achieved by the Houses and the Combined Cadet Force in our Autumn Term assemblies.

In a School with such a strong military history, with so many pupils whose parents are in the forces, Remembrance Week has an important place in the Chapel calendar. Throughout the week leading up to Remembrance Sunday, the CCF took a very active role in helping us frame our reflections. One significant moment was the ceremonial laying up of the old CCF standard, which is now permanently housed in the Scout Chapel. The new CCF standard was blessed, signifying our enduring respect for our armed forces and marking our commitment to remembrance. It was good to commemorate Remembrance Sunday in a very full Chapel, and for the School to take part in the parade to the War Memorial and in the laying of wreaths.

The Christian year follows a series of different emotions, colours, and particular attributes of faith as we walk through the seasons from ordinary time, through Advent, Christmas, Epiphany and on to Lent, Easter and Pentecost. The year is constantly oscillating between giving thanks, asking for forgiveness, and waiting in hope and anticipation and our Chapel themes each week help us explore the values we hold as a School community. One clear element of hope and excitement was demonstrated for us in the Pre-Prep pupils' Harvest Festival. Their singing was beautiful and joyful, and reminded us of the virtues of gratitude and generosity which are the bedrock of this community.

In a School Chapel, Advent is a very short season and so it was not long until we were into our carol services. We were treated to two very good Senior School carol services at which the choir and all the readers excelled, and gave our celebrations a sense of occasion and dignity. It was a particular joy to end the term with the Prep School carol service, sending us out full of cheer and excitement for the arrival of Christmas proper.

The Prep School's Easter Service focussed on the journey through Holy Week as recounted in the Gospel of St. Mark.

The pupils participated actively in the service, learning about sacrifice, love and leadership through the pace and emotions of the events in the Gospel account leading up to Jesus' death and resurrection.

Their readings, hymns and participation in reflections drew out the importance of Holy Week and Easter in the Christian year for our understanding of faith.

During the Lent Term, seven pupils from the Senior School underwent catechesis in preparation for Confirmation. They attended the Friday Eucharist in Chapel each week, and in our Confirmation preparation discussions together they explored different parts of Christian life, bringing their questions and own perspectives and sharing their thoughts with one another. As a group they demonstrated a real growth in spiritual maturity and confidence. This year we were very fortunate to have the Bishop of Tewkesbury (Bishop to Schools in the Diocese of Gloucester) join us on Pentecost Sunday to confirm these students, two of whom were also baptised. Baptism and Confirmation are very significant milestones in a Christian's journey of faith, a moment of each person saying: "Yes, this is what I believe" and to celebrate growing in faith, and it was a joy to have parents, family and friends in Chapel to support and pray for them and to receive Holy Communion together. Bishop Robert led the pupils through the service with an inspiring sermon, poignant moments and plenty of laughter, and enjoyed getting to know the pupils during their preparation and after the service with cake and drinks in the sunshine.

In the Summer Term, the Senior School

again held Make a Difference Day, a day dedicated to putting the values explored in Chapel services and assemblies throughout the year into practice within the local community. Pupils engaged in a variety of activities, including visiting care homes, assisting at a primary school sports day, and contributing to the upkeep of the local environment. Year 9 pupils undertook a sponsored hike for charity, reflecting on individual and community wellbeing. The day began in Chapel to remind us of the role faith and reflection plays in preparing each of us to play an active part in society by supporting others and caring for the world locally and globally. We were super excited and proud to see our purple Wycliffe flag, we rushed up for a photo! Guest of honour, Margaret Kenyatta, opened the ceremony, amidst vibrant musical and dance performances. The auditorium was filled with songs from Brookhouse choir, including solos from former Brookhouse pupils Brianna and Nikita Kering.

Pupils shared the story of Wangari Maathai (the first Kenyan and African woman to win the Nobel Peace Prize), and Maaathai's story of The Hummingbird was brought to life by children from Prep years who shared a captivating performance with audience participation. Mr Stone continued this theme of every little step contributes to a bigger impact during his assembly at the Prep School. During the Opening Ceremony, a welcome address was given by Round Square Chairman/ Brookhouse Head of School, John O'Connor, and Round Square Chief Executive, Rachael Westgarth, including a standing wave in tribute to Kurt Hahn. Again, another proud moment for us was when 'Wycliffe College' was announced and we stood up to represent our School. The Service Day made the most impact on us, we were moved by the joy and cheer that the young children showed, we entered classes with roughly 50 pupils with teachers switching between multiple lessons.

To quote **Madison**, "This provided me with valuable insights into the challenges in Kenyan education. I also got to speak to many inspiring children who are far less fortunate than myself. They left me very touched with their bright outlooks and resilience and gifted me with a new perspective of the world".

The Conference ended with an inspirational Keynote address by Paralympic Athlete, Henry Wanyoike, followed by a Closing Ceremony, which included pupil performances, a tribute to Round Square's late president, King Constantine. The evening finished with a spectacular live performance from Kenyan chart-toppers Sauti Sol. This was another highlight for our Wycliffe pupils. Before we headed back to the airport, we even managed to squeeze in a visit to the Nairobi Giraffe Sanctuary!

During the entire conference there was a strong running theme, Ubuntu: I am, because we are. We returned with a huge feeling of gratitude and a burning desire to continue making a difference no matter

how small. To quote **Madison** again, "This trip was truly unforgettable, and I am beyond grateful to have been given this opportunity. I strongly hope everyone gets to visit Kenya at least once to help shape the minds of others".




