Giffords has garnered international acclaim for its unique blend of traditional circus arts and theatrical storytelling but more importantly there is a strong sense of those who live in Gloucestershire and especially in and around Stroud, that it is indeed 'our circus'.

In the same way, our drama performances this year have transported us to the oceans with the Year 3s and 4s putting on the very funny and fantastically sung 'Pirates and Mermaids' with outstanding performances

In a traditional circus' there is a ring master - who co-ordinates and leads. We have had six ring masters this year - our Heads of School! I hand over to our first two for

their reflections of their time at Wycliffe. A quote from **Nell Gifford**, founder of 'our' circus:

'Under the big top, excellence is sought. Practice takes hours and days and weeks and months and making mistakes, and getting back up again is part of the normal routine. Excellence comes with hard work, with being aspirational and with a clear route to how to be successful.' Our Year 6s discovered this is a recent Circus Skills workshop where the circus performer said that in order to move from juggling four balls to five took an hour a day for a full year in order to perfect the skill. It does not come overnight!

been introduced to the pupils as a way of facilitating discussion ensuring that all have a voice and are listened to - a highly essential skill in today's world. Year 5 have taken part in an international Show and Tell, the Round Square Club has a padlet up and running with several other schools celebrating the diversity of our Community through food and Sarah Langlands, our incredible librarian, has been working with the Reading Ambassadors on a similar padlet with a member school. Tyler Brindley has to be recognised for his work on this teamalong with Cora Hill, Ben Warrington,

Philip Astley, the father of the circus, is credited with discovering that the ideal size for a circus ring is 42 feet in diameter. This was the optimum size that enabled him to use centrifugal force to help balance on a horse's back. As he rode at speed around the ring, he used gravity to push himself

into the horse's back and so prevent a fall onto the sawdust floor. This then created the 'big top' shape that we are all so familiar with today - all borne out of science and engineering. DT is a subject which we are proud of at the Prep - from superb Christmas cake decorations with special mention of Ellie-Brooke McCann, Daryna Salenko and Wilf Rogers for their masterpieces and Charlie Geddes, Theo Farebrother and Seraphine Mosimann for their innovative and design work creating habitats for garden creatures. For the Discovery programme the Cotswold Flying Club came in with their glider simulator and Angus Newland won a glider flight!

each morning. Yes, it did make me jump on more than one occasion, and yes, I did start talking to her at one point!



After half term, the class's attention turned to the learning theme of transport. Children worked together to build their very own train engine from junk and recyclable materials. They painted this huge train a lovely shade of blue and used it in the role-play area until the poor train could ride no more.

Linked to transport, the class made a short trip to Putloe Court to ride on horse-drawn buggies and spent a fun few minutes racing around the arena at speed. Mrs. Hawes was thrilled?! I must say a big thank you to Mrs. Gillman, Harriet's grandma, for hosting the children for the morning.

As the term progressed, children represented the Pre-Prep department perfectly during our School Remembrance Day celebrations and enjoyed bringing their favourite teddies to School as we raised money for Children in Need. The class took a short trip to Quedgeley Library, listening to stories and exploring the super array of books available to them on the day.

Attention quickly turned to Christmas and all the wonderful festivities we experience here in December. Children baked



Christmas cakes, visited Bethlehem in the role-play area, and welcomed magician Magic Marie to School once again as their Christmas entertainment. Of course, the children performed brilliantly in our Nativity production, singing confidently and delivering lines for all to hear in the Studio Theatre.

In the Spring Term, Mrs. Hawes challenged children to begin learning simple sounds in Read Write Inc phonics lessons and to write their names with improved accuracy. Linked to the learning theme of Space, the class continued to creatively make junk



models, including a large-scale rocket that could be seen flying around the classroom! Pupils were encouraged to try Space food, including dehydrated mashed potatoes (SMASH to you and me), and they even had a go at making some dehydrated fruits themselves.

The Spring Term was full of trips and visits too. The class ended their Space-themed learning by visiting Bristol Aerospace and celebrated World Book Day by taking a trip to Stroud Bookshop, where they redeemed their WBD tokens. Another thank you must go to Mr. King, our parent paramedic, who brought his ambulance to School for the children to explore. A real-life superhero!

After many Easter eggs both here and at home, the children returned to School to learn about plants. Pupils planted a number of seeds and tended to them throughout the term. They grew sunflowers, beans, herbs, cucumbers, carrots, and spring onions. We hope, now that the plants are at home, they are continuing to get the care and attention they deserve!

Another trip to Quedgeley Library provided an opportunity for pupils to donate some of the class plants to the Quedgeley community garden, and a final trip of the year to Cotswold Wildlife Park allowed children to explore a range of plants and wildlife from across the globe.

RECEPTION AND YEAR 1

To start the year in September, children built their learning around the theme of "All About Me."

They created self-portraits using paint in art lessons with Mrs. Oldham and using the Purple Mash software on the new bank of Pre-Prep Surface Go tablets. Children explored the science of the human body, naming key body parts and the five senses.

The class prepared perfectly for our Harvest service in the chapel just before half term. Together, they sang "I Can Eat a Rainbow" brilliantly before taking a well-earned break in preparation for a busy term in the run-up to Christmas.

Our learning theme changed and the class focus turned to the history of transport.

Children explored a range of modes of transport, from trains to planes, discussing when they were invented and the impact these inventions had on countries around the world.

This inspired their first trip of the year to Swindon Steam Museum, where the class saw firsthand the engineering and hard work that went into building steam engines and a rail network that would change the face of travel in this country. They dressed up and took on the roles of Isambard Kingdom Brunel and the hard-working Navvies, immersing themselves into life in Victorian Britain.

In preparation for our Christmas celebrations, the class began learning songs and their lines for the performance of "The Twinkly Nativity." Academic







ART

This year, our Prep School Art has been incredibly busy and enriching.

Our diverse curriculum kept pupils engaged and inspired. Pupils were encouraged to use their imaginations, creativity, innovation, and sustainability, exploring and experimenting with a broad range of artistic mediums while developing their problemsolving skills.

Pupils experimented with sculpting using wire, clay, papier-mâché, cardboard construction, and mudrock. Year 8 produced masks inspired by the artist AJ Fosik, Year 7 'Fantastical Fish' hanging sculptures, and Year 6' Zoomorphic Clay Masks'. Year 5 made papier-mâché desserts and ice creams named 'Sweet Treats and other Yums' with Years 4 and 3 Kinetic mobiles, NZ Maori 'Taniwhas', and Totem poles.

Pupils strengthened their drawing and painting skills through observational drawings and numerous painting projects, broadening their technical abilities. The pupils learnt about worldwide cultures, such as Balinese, New Zealand, Japanese, Native American, and African, and they researched contemporary artists, art movements, and pop culture, gaining a deeper appreciation for cultural art forms.

Our diverse 'Saturday Discovery' programme and 'Into the Heart of Art' days further enriched the pupils' experience. Highlights included Kintsugi, where the Year 8s learned the Japanese art of repairing broken pottery with gold; Year 7s developed projects on Onomatopoeia

and mixed media drawing processes using inks, charcoal, pastels, bleach, and graphite pencils. Year 6 students created low-relief cardboard landscapes. The 'Into the Heart of Art' days were particularly engaging, with Year 5 crafted clay coiled pots and Year 3 and 4 created textural animals whilst responding to classical music!

All the pupils have worked incredibly hard, had a lot of fun and I am very proud of all the work they have achieved this year!



DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY






Year 8 pupils had an enriching experience learning about aerodynamics from an MOD engineer and a member of the Cotswold Gliding Club. **Angus Newland,** who excelled in the overall STEM project, demonstrated a keen understanding of glider flight principles. He eagerly anticipates his complimentary flight this

summer. Additionally, pupils had the opportunity to sit in the glider and engage with a flight simulator, deepening their practical understanding of aviation.

Phone Stands

Year 8 pupils at embarked on an exciting new project that began with mastering isometric drawing and progressed to designing and prototyping phone stands. Initially, they learned the basics of isometric projection, creating accurate three-dimensional representations. They then applied these skills to sketching practical and aesthetically pleasing phone stands. Utilising computer-aided design (CAD) software, they refined their designs in a digital 3D environment, ensuring precision





and detail. Finally, pupils brought their concepts to life by constructing prototypes from cardboard, allowing them to test and improve their designs. This comprehensive project not only enhanced their technical skills but also fostered creativity and problem-solving, providing a solid foundation in design and engineering. Teyo McBurney and Molly Pettingell excelled in this project.

Cheese Scones

In an exciting start to the School year, our Year 7 pupils have successfully embarked on a healthy eating project, creating a selection of delicious soups and cheese scones. This hands-on initiative taught them about balanced diets, emphasising the importance of vegetables for vitamins, cheese for protein and calcium, and carbohydrates for energy. Pupils enjoyed peeling and cutting vegetables, measuring ingredients, and kneading dough, all while developing essential culinary and mathematical skills. They also learned about food miles and the importance of shopping locally to support sustainability. This project not only imparted valuable cooking skills but also laid a strong foundation for lifelong healthy eating habits, showcasing that learning can be both fun and impactful.







We started with Year 7 performing 'Elf Jr' at Christmas, where **Abigail Eyre** was brilliant as the highly energetic Buddy the Elf. Years 5 and 6 performed 'Cinderella', the title role being played by **Tilda Adams** who sang beautifully throughout.

Pirates vs Mermaids was a complete hit. Full of upbeat songs, the students of Years 3 and 4 were superb. Oliver Fry was a great lead as Captain Scarypants, going against the Mermaid Boss played fabulously by Mamie McBurney. We have also introduced LAMDA classes to our Prep School, which has proven to be very popular, with students taking 1:1 classes

ENGLISH

The English department has overseen several initiatives both within and outside the classroom to develop our pupils' reading, writing and speaking skills this academic year.

In collaboration with the Library, there has been a strong drive to promote independent reading with a number of book talks, peer recommendations and reading challenges taking place across the Prep School. The School's growing reading culture was further reinforced with the Cheltenham Literacy Festival, with every pupil attending a workshop. The Pre-Prep attended an engaging draw-a-long session with author and illustrator Rob Biddulph. Years 3 and 4 went to see the highly entertaining Pamela Butchart (see below), while Years 5 and 6 enjoyed Thomas Taylor bringing to life monsters, magic and mystery on a tour of the marvellous world of Eerie-on-Sea. Year 7 met Julian Sedgiwck and illustrator Chie Kutsuwada

in exploring the world of manga graphic novels. Finally, Year 8 were inspired to write their own Gothic descriptions after listening to Gothic writer Tanya Landman.

Alongside reading and poetry writing, oracy has been at the heart of the English curriculum this year. In Year 5, the standard of the Personal Project presentations was extremely high, as pupils spoke with poise and life about their personal interests: a special mention to Daisy Oldham and Jemma Crighton-Pavlou for receiving the top accolade of distinction. The Year 6 pupils showed flair for public speaking in their Saturday morning Discovery workshops where they were introduced to the key elements of debating. They learnt

about the formal etiquette of how a debate is structured and demonstrated confidence and enthusiasm in debating whether zoos should be banned.

The Year 7 pupils started the academic year participating in a three-week Model United Nations simulation in their Discovery Programme. This helped them develop their collaboration skills as they worked in teams to research and then take on representation of an appointed country. In the final showcase the pupils delivered a proposal from their countries' perspective and then had to listen to other viewpoints and compromise to reach an agreed common resolution. In the second term, the Year 7 pupils were presenting





once again as they completed their Poetry by Heart recital in front of a guest judge from the Rotary Club. The standard of performance in terms of articulation and expression was very impressive, with many pupils stepping out of their comfort zone in presenting their chosen poem. Cora Hill had the audience fully engaged with her powerful interpretation of one of Emily Bronte's poems. Finally, the Year 8 pupils showed their confidence and public speaking skills in delivering a persuasive speech to their peers: Seraphine Mosimann, Teyo McBurney, Georgina Latimer, Molly Pettingell and Lula Turner were among the standout speakers on this occasion. All the Year 8 pupils were then able to transfer these skills in delivering presentations in assemblies as part of the Kirby Challenge. Oracy remains a key life skill that Wycliffe Prep holds dearly as we strive to produce confident, compassionate global citizens ready to take on the world through public speaking.

GEOGRAPHY

MODERN FOREIGN LANGUAGES





Languages at Wycliffe Prep

French is taught from Nursery to Year 8. In Year 8, pupils start learning a second language. From next academic year, pupils will be able to choose Spanish or Japanese.

In Pre-Prep, French is introduced in a simple, yet engaging way and follows as much as possible the class's topics, 'Transport' or 'Food' for example, with much opportunity for speaking and listening, singing and playing games.

As pupils progress in their language learning, we start introducing more reading and writing.

Our curriculum is fluency focused because we know that language students want to be able to use the language they are learning.

Across the department we are using a teaching methodology called EPI (Extensive Processing Instruction).

This essentially means that we are flooding pupils with repeated high frequency language chunks and structures in different forms to assist uptake and retention.

Language is introduced aurally as the brain is hardwired to learn language through the ears. Phonics are explicitly taught and new language is modelled so that we build our pupil's speaking confidence. The language taught is provided on a sentence builder, which pupils refer to for support.

Grammar is introduced as bitesize chunks and is carefully sequenced so that pupils can adapt the language they are learning independently and accurately.

Repetition increases the retrieval speed when remembering but having fun is also an essential ingredient in order to embed new language in the brain.

Fun fact: Research has identified that pupils often need to see a word up to 17

times before it goes into their long-term memory. Some words are of course easier to remember and have more "stickability" than others.

European Day of Languages

A 'Languages open many doors' door decorating competition was the theme of our European Day of Languages this year. Tutor groups celebrated our culturally rich community. Nepal, Nigeria, Ukraine, Fiji, India, China, Japan, Spain amongst many others were represented. We all learn some interesting facts along the way! The day coincided with the Macmillan cake sale and Wycliffe Prep got baking for charity with an international flavour.

Year 8 Trips

In the Autumn Term, Year 8 German learners went to experience some Christmas cheer at Bristol Christmas market and the Spanish learners tried some South American dishes at a local restaurant.

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RELIGIOUS STUDIES

Teaching Religious Studies this year has included a variety of new topics and perspectives.

The broad knowledge and content covered across each year group covers various religious and non-religious views. This year, the Year 8s have completed coursework on Sikhism after visiting the Cardiff Gurdwara in January, learning about their faith and customs. This was an enriching experience, with many learning a lot about this aspect of religious belief for the first time. Pupils can share their perspectives, listen to

others, and then reconsider their ideas. In Year 6, pupils investigated the importance of the Silk Route and the growth of Islam throughout the Middle Ages, as well as how this new faith altered and changed the world we live in today. In Year 7, in the Spring Term some pupils enjoyed a class Passover meal, led by a Rabbi, to help them to understand the important meanings of this Jewish festival. In Year 8, we once

again had a lively discussion with adults from various religious perspectives with a 'Questions of Faith' morning. Religious Studies encourages pupils to understand the multi-cultural world we live in better and helps them to question and consider other viewpoints through discussion and lively debate.

Year 7 Passover Meal

Some of our Year 7 pupils have been learning about Judaism and experienced one of their festivals in the classroom on a Monday in February- the Pesach (Passover) meal.

They were joined online by Rabbi Zvi Solomons, who explained the significance and meaning of the meal. It was a fun way to remember what this meal means to Jewish people around the world and learn about the Seder plate with the items that tell the story of the Hebrew people escaping slavery in Egypt during the time of Moses.

Sikh Gurdwara Visit

Year 8 pupils enjoyed their first ever visit to a Sikh Gurdwara in February in order to discover aspects of Sikh belief and practices. They had a lovely discussion followed by a visit to the worship/prayer room and to the langar dining area, where pupils ate their food.

It gave them all a memory and impression of Sikhism in the UK today and was a precursor to completing their own Sikhism Coursework.



SCIENCE

We are big believers of STEM at Wycliffe and in Science this year we have had a real drive on getting as much STEM into teaching time as possible.

Year 5 and 6

As part of the College STEM Years 5 and 6 were shown various activities by Year 12 and 13 pupils, these included designing your own vaccine and the use of polymers.

Year 6

As part of their STEM Saturdays, Year 6 were tasked with making the fastest geared LEGO® buggy and a raft out of recyclable material that could carry the heaviest load on water.

Year 7

As part of team and STEM, Year 7 were tasked with building carts they could ride on and race. This involved the major principles of STEM and cooperating to finish on time.















Book Week in March was a huge success, thanks to the hard work of our Subject Leaders and Reading Ambassadors, who prepared, organised and ran a range of reading activities over the course of the week.

From decorating class doors as a book cover to Dress as a Book Character, there was a buzz of excitement throughout the week. In our Book Day Assembly, the pupils learnt how 'reading your way' gives them agency in developing their own reading habits in terms of choice, time and place. Tuesday's Drop Everything and Read highlighted the range of locations where reading can take place. Learning Beyond the Classroom

FOREST SCHOOL

It has been a wonderful year of Forest School sessions for all the pupils in the Pre-Prep department.

Every session the children arrive full of enthusiasm, ready to learn, explore, build and play. My mantra is that the classes are always there to, 'T.U.F.N. up!' by building confidence in at least one of these areas every time they visit:

T is for TRUST – in themselves and each other, by challenging themselves with new tasks and activities, understanding that there are risks and so making good choices as well as building trust with the Forest School staff, who are always there to support.

U is for UNDERSTANDING – spending time in the Forest School setting, learning about the wide variety of flora and fauna but also learning new skills, like willow weaving, den building and the safe way to create some basic whittling items.

F is for FUN – come rain or shine we will be out in Forest School creating, learning and exploring. Every session is child led, so we build on ideas that the children have come up with and provide opportunities for different experiences. Whether this is following recipes in the mud kitchen, going on a 'bear hunt' through the woods or playing on the gigantic tractor tyres donated this term by Mr Carter. The only limit is their imagination.

N is for NATURE – the opportunity for the children to spend time in the beautiful setting that we have at Wycliffe Prep is amazing. For these young children to watch the changing seasons, learn about nature and build a set of life skills in a natural environment is a wonderful experience and I have thoroughly enjoyed guiding them this year.

At the end of every session the children think about what they have achieved – what have they done to 'T.U.F.N. up!' and what they would like to do the next time they are in the woods. After they reflect on their visit, finally it is time to leave the setting at least as good as they found it, if not even better! It is a privilege for me to lead these sessions and instil in the children the Forest School ethos of togetherness, community and care.

I would like to thank all the staff that have worked with me in Forest School this year for their support and enthusiasm, Mrs Gittins, Miss Hobbs, Miss Parrott, Miss Margrett, Miss Elliott and Mr Davis. Without them, none of the experiences for the children would be possible and I look forward to another action-packed year of Forest School sessions, starting in September.











NATIONAL POETRY DAY

During National Poetry Day, pupils were challenged to consider 'What makes a poem, a poem?'. A number of quotations were reviewed such as Maya Angelou's: 'Poetry is music written for the human voice'; pupils were then asked to come up with their own definitions, which included 'an explosion of words' and 'dancing words'. During the Poetry Assembly, pupils from Year 3 up to Year 8 presented their favourite poems with strong projection and expression.

This included **Dorsa Safizadeh Amzajerdi** and **Emilie Leblond** presenting their chosen poems in their first language, highlighting the universal power of poetry and the global nature of this medium. In the classroom, poems around the theme of 'refuge' were analysed and discussed.

This prompted a range of our own pupil poetic writing including Molly Pettingell's poem entitled 'Rebuilding' which finished second in the Rotary Club District writing competition. Theo Farebrother also went on to write a particularly poignant poem which he recited at our Remembrance Service.

DISCOVERY PROGRAMME

Our Discovery Programme has continued to deliver an exhilarating series of learning experiences for our Year 6 to 8 pupils on Saturday mornings.

Our Discovery units are designed to build learners' skills of oracy, collaboration, and leadership, and we have enjoyed showcasing our learning in front of families.

Highlights over the Autumn Term included a Kintsugi Art and Philosophy unit, which provided our Year 8 pupils with a fresh perspective around perceived imperfections, a Year 7 Model United Nations series delivering lessons on diplomacy and effective communication and an Entrepreneurship and Enterprise project that sparked creativity and innovation in our Year 6 children - raising £565.91 for our School charity - Scoo-B-Doo Neonatal charity, through the 'Make £5 Grow' initiative. Across the year, groups were also engaged with a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics) exercise, a skills of debate unit, an Equity, Diversity and Inclusion workshop and a morning of sporting activity - Kaleidoscope





of Sport! Our Language Café sessions provided 'taster' activities in German, Spanish and Japanese.

During the Summer Term, we welcomed a polar explorer, Mr. Alex Hibbert. Fitting with our Encompass Theme of Adventure, Alex presented on his experiences leading expeditions across the High Arctic, sharing his stories of resilience and teamwork.





YEAR 8 CAREERS MORNING

As part of their ongoing careers development, Year 8 pupils attended a morning focused on how different choices can influence their futures.

In the morning, pupils listened to two fascinating talks on two very different career pathways to enable them to see what is behind different careers and how to achieve in that field. One talk was led by **Philipp Mosimann**, Managing Director of Mosimann's Private Dining Club & Sensational Events, who discussed the

need to be your own brand ambassador and the many skills needed for a job in hospitality and catering. Melanie Lean, Equine Veterinary Surgeon, then discussed the different opportunities involved in Veterinary studies and her own specialist area of Equine medicine, bringing in many props for pupils to look at and discussing

Pupils at the Prep School have enjoyed another year with a wonderful array of opportunities, with pupils able to explore a range of physical and enriching trips and visits.

Within Middle Prep, Years 3 and 4 commenced the year with a History visit to the Roman Villa Museum at The Newt in Somerset, where they explored artefacts and stories as they stepped back in time. Years 3, 4 and 5 continued their trips to the much-loved Copsegrove Farm in Bisley, undertaking a series of nature-based Forest School activities. For the first time, the whole Middle Prep department joined forces for their Autumn Term Expedition Day, with team-building activities followed by a collective trip to AirHop, putting a little bounce into their School day. The Autumn Term also created the opportunity for Middle Prep to visit the Cheltenham Literature Festival each year, engaging in a workshop with a range of authors to help

build a lifelong love of reading. Years 3 and 4 in the Spring Term visited Cadbury World, whilst Year 5 got their walking boots on up to Selsley Common. Year 5 then went further afield, with their living history residential visit to York as part of their study of the Vikings, in which they were archaeologists at DIG, experienced the life of a Viking at Murton Park, and visited the renowned Jorvik Museum to help bring the past to life. Into the Summer Term, Year 4 got the opportunity for their residential, visiting Hooke Court in Dorset, participating in various activities, and visiting and learning about the on site working farm. The Summer Term culminated with Years 3 and 4 exploring the National Trust Woodchester Park estate

Lincoln has had a good year, with lots of individual and House successes. Although we've not managed to retain our top spot, pupils have worked really hard to get house points and excellents for the house.


The final event of the year was House Swimming with pupils in Years 3 - 8 taking part in. We came third with 109 points beating Scott with 81 points.
